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Quirky facts from Halton Hills' past

The church that makes up part of the **Georgetown library** is a former Congregational Church that was built in 1854.

Limehouse was known as Fountain Green until the post office opened in 1857.

Lucy Maud Montgomery, the famous author of **Anne of Green Gables**, lived in Norval between 1926 and 1935. She wrote five novels during this time, including **Pat of Silver Bush** and **Emily's Quest**.

More than 600 Georgetown residents suddenly found themselves unemployed when the Diefenbaker government cancelled the **Avro Arrow** project in 1959.

The Club at North Halton dates back to 1914 when it was known as Cedar Crest. The golf course closed during World War II and reopened in 1954 as North Halton Golf and Country Club. It has been in continuous operation ever since.

St. Alban's Anglican Church in Glen Williams officially opened in 1903 and cost of \$3,500 to build.

George Kennedy, the man who Georgetown is named after, was partially blinded in both eyes during the War of 1812.

Glen Williams was known as Williamsburg until the post office opened in 1852.
