Keep dogs leashed on trails, says mayor

Coyotes adapt well to urban and rural environments but homeowners can take steps to make their property less appealing to the animals. Residents should properly store and maintain garbage containers, and use enclosed composting containers rather than piles. Trash bins should be placed inside an enclosed structure to discourage the presence of small rodents, which are an important food source for coyotes. Homeowners should not leave their dog or cat unattended in their yards, especially at night.

Aggressive behaviour towards people is unusual for coyotes, but people should always exercise caution around wildlife, said Harris. If a coyote poses an immediate threat or danger to public safety, call 911.

"I know that other communities are experiencing sightings of coyotes," said Mayor Rick Bonnette. "I urge residents to keep their dogs on a leash when using local trails. Anyone living near ravine or natu-

ral area should be cautious of their dogs and cats, as there have been unfortunate incidents of attacks resulting in the loss of pets."

The Ministry of Natural Resources (MNR) is responsible for the management of wildlife in urban areas, and its website offers valuable information for residents wishing to become more aware of how to deal with coyotes.
