## SPORTS & SPO join the world for four days of frozen frivolity

With several hundred teams applying and only 132 earning a coveted invitation, three local area shinny squads were fortunate enough to be chosen to play in the World Pond Hockey Championships, held earlier this month in Plaster Rock, N.B.

The remote village of Plaster Rock hosted 120 men's and a dozen women's teams from across North America and beyond for four days of outdoor hockey and social festivities in the 10th anniversary of the event.

Twenty-four rinks are set up on Roulston Lake, with 48 teams playing 3-on-3 games simultaneously under perfect conditions in a snowglobe-like setting. A similar event in Huntsville scheduled for late January had to be cancelled due to warm temperatures.

For Acton resident Kevin Ward, who undertook his sixth trip to the tournament, making the two-day drive and playing in sometimes -30 Celsius windy conditions is well worth it.

His four-man Acton Tanners Pub & Grill entry, also consisting of two New Brunswick residents and another from Vancouver, went 0-5 in the preliminary round again this year and didn't make the playoff round, but they were far from disappointed.

"The best part for me is seeing people who go there for the first time, they can't get over how amazing the whole setup is," said Ward, an account manager for a Mississauga cable and wire firm.

"The guys will be telling stories about it for months afterwards. 'Do er great thing is that it's for charity, to help keep the arena there running for the kids and the money goes to a lot of other good things in the community.'

Twenty-two-year-old Blake Seaton was a first-time visitor to Plaster Rock this year along with his dad Ian and three other buddies he played minor hockey with in town, calling themselves the Georgetown Raiders.

Staying in a trailer on the shore of Lake Roulston, the Raiders went 3-2 in the preliminary round and were denied a berth in the 32-team playoff, falling 18-15 to a team from New Jersey that left them in 35th place.

"It was kind of disappointing that we didn't make the playoffs because we thought we would've finished higher, but we were in a tough pool," said Seaton, who unsuccessfully applied to get into the tourney last

"It's a completely different game from regular hockey. You have to be so good with puck possession, playing the trap and countering on the other team's mistakes. All in all though, it We'd like to find a charity from this area to represent next year and hopefully we get invited back, because a Club. lot of people told us we were lucky to get in this time."
