won't have ANY germination. For seeds that you know you won't use, consider donating them to a horticulture society seed exchange.

Something else that I found lurking in the gardening cupboard was a collection of the summer-flowering corms, tubers and bulbs that I saved from last year. A few of these wonderful plants were beginning to show growth and that meant yet another task at hand. The dahlias can be potted up for a head start and you can even do some cuttings and add to your collection once they get going. There are many sites on the web that give instructions but here is a good one with pictures: http://www.cooltropicalplants.com/Propagatingdahlias.html.

Begonia tubers hardly need instruction. Just press them into a shallow container filled with sterilized potting mix and watch them grow. Many other summer flowering plants- pineapple lilies (Eucomis sp.), calla lilies, nerines, etc.- will need new soil, warmth and light to get them off to a good start.

TEND TO YOUR HOUSEPLANTS

My houseplants aren't actually in a gardening cupboard, but the task of pruning and repotting is a good one for this time of year. I like to give the plants a wash in the sink or shower to remove the dust and grime that settles in the winter and clip off any long lanky winter growth. The spring sunshine will give the plants better light conditions and make for denser growth.

Once you see strong new growth, you can begin a fertilizing regime for many

those sharpened and cleaned pruners and get out there. The best hint I have heard to date is to wrap a bungee cord or two around the whole clump before cutting. Then cut the stems down to between 3 and 12 inches depending on the size of the grass. I leave 12" on the large Miscanthus 'Giganteus' but only 3" on the smaller/shorter grasses.

It is best to do it while the ground is frozen so you don't disturb the spring flowering bulbs that are almost ready to burst forth. My friend Diana Pooke, a Master Gardener in Georgetown sent along the before and after shots included here.

If you are moving your houseplant to a larger container, remember to only increase the size by an inch or two in depth and diameter so to avoid root rot from too much wet soil. (The beautiful orange Clivia sp. shown here is an exception to potting up. Wait until it is about to burst the pot before moving to a larger container, otherwise it will stop flowering. It just likes to be crowded.)


