The Region of Peel's Long Range Transportation Plan and the Halton-Peel Boundary Study have identified the need for improvements to address planned growth on Bovaird Drive from Lake Louise Drive/Worthington Avenue to 1.45 kilometres west of Heritage Road (see map). The aim of the Class EA process is to involve the public and agencies in creating the best solution for the study corridor. The project team, with public and agency input:

- defines the problem statement;
- develops and evaluates planning alternatives; and,
- determines a preferred solution.

Public Information Centre #1

The first Public Information Centre (PIC) was held on May 18, 2010. Following PIC#1, staff reviewed input from the public and agencies and confirmed the preferred planning solution:

- widen Bovaird Drive with intersection improvements; and,
- provide for transit service facilities, a sidewalk and a multi-use trail.

Public Information Centre # 2

PIC#2 will present:

- the technical report findings and recommendations:
- · a review of alternative design concepts;
- the recommended design concept.

PIC#2 is set up as a drop-in centre with information presented on boards. Staff will be available to answer your questions and take comments on the information.

Upon completion of the study, the Notice of Study Completion and an Environmental Study Report (ESR) that presents the study findings will be published. The results of the study will be available for review for 30 calendar davs.
