Georgetown man nominates town for Kraft Tour

Georgetown is on the list of Canadian communities that are vying to host The Sports Network for a day in August and receive \$25,000 for the Halton Hills Arena Users Group.

The fourth-annual Kraft Celebration Tour is slated to run Aug. 17-26 when TSN will broadcast its flagship sports news program Sports-Centre live in 10 communities across Canada in 10 days, with the winning entries also awarded \$25,000 each towards improvements to a local recreation facility.

Local native Dave Frost made the nomination

for Georgetown and as someone with three young who children himself grew up playing minor hockey in Georgetown, would like to see the funds go towards the construction of the two new arenas at the Mold-

Masters Sportsplex and another in Acton. "The bottom

line for me doing this to hopefully get something to help out with the building of the new rinks," said Frost, a distribution supervisor for Gerrie Electric.

Frost put together a short essay and submitted a photo of him with his three kids posing with the Stanley Cup here last December to illustrate why Georgetown deserves to be a part of the tour.

So far, 82 communities have had their nominations accepted and the closing date is June 10. On July 1, the field will be whittled down to 20 towns and an on-line voting contest will begin on July 9 to determine the 10 winners.
