At that point, the deer was half in the water with its front legs up on the ice, but when Gary Beck, an animal control officer from the Upper Credit Humane Society arrived, the deer had managed to get out of the lake and good ending to the drama was lying down on the

ice near the edge. Beck called police and the fire department, which sent out a crew who assessed the scene and then called the rescue unit, which was on-hold for an incident in Georgetown.

As everyone waited, Beck suggested that the firefighters try startling the deer with the loud horns and sirens – and to the immense relief of everyone there, it worked.


