Bennett Place deal nears end

Halton Hills council ratified its decision recently not to pursue its road maintenance negotiations with Bennett Place residents.

Since 1996 the Town, based on a verbal agreement, had provided snow clearing and grading on the private road of nine

homes in Glen Williams- on the condition the residents pay for it. But in recent years. the Town had been struggling to get payment for the \$2,770 service.

Late last fall, the Town sent a notice to terminate the agreement. But in December, the residents pleaded for time to negotiate a new agreement. The Town continued discussions until April when staff came to the conclusion an agreement could not be made

after one of the nine property owners refused to sign the deal.

Councillors made the decision without commenting on a letter that was faxed to the Town the same day, requesting deferral of the ratification until October.

Susan Powell, representing Bennett Place residents, wrote they were looking into addressing the stormwater issue of the holdout resident. The drainage and grading work could involve the Town, Halton Region and a gas company on the placement of water and gas lines.

"A deferral of the vote concerning Bennett Place will enable the owners to address the issues and come up a plan to improve the road and put it into effect. We would then be in a position to continue negotiations with the Town concern-

rendered." Wards 1&2 Regional Councillor Clark Somerville saw it similarly saying later "it's too bad we couldn't come to an agreement, but enough is enough."
