for 13 years and in December, his discharge from hospital was in jeopardy because he did not have a proper hospital bed and special lift – both which were donated to the family after an appeal in The New Tanner. Gerrard said without with donations of the hospital bed and equipment, her husband might not have been able to come home, just before Christmas. "Everybody was so amazing – what a wonderful community." Gerrard leaves his wife, daughters, Jessica,

13, and Ashley, 14, and an extended family. Visitation is scheduled for 2 to 4 p.m. and again from 7 to 9 p.m. today (Thursday) at the MacKinnon Family Funeral Home, and a funeral service will be held tomorrow (Friday) at St. Alban-the-Martyr Church at 1:30 p.m.
