Acton man in a Race to Space

"To me, space" goes beyond mere interest. It is a way of life."

Former Acton resident William Kirby, now a Biology student at Dalhousie University in Halifax – is in the Race for Space – an international contest run by Metro newspaper to call "shotgun" on the first commercial space flight in 2014.

Kirby, who graduated from Acton High five years ago, currently holds first place in support in Canada among over 1,200 entries. The entries that receive the most votes in each Metro country will be judged by a local jury that selects one local finalist. Every Metro country will send one local finalist to the global final. The winner will be chosen by a global jury.

The winner will attend two training missions in the Netherlands, before being flown to the Caribbean island of Curacao, where their space trip begins in a Lynx Mk II, where the winner will ride in the back seat, behind a professional instructor. Metro is asking people to tell why they are perfectly suited for the mission, and then gather as many votes as possible via Facebook or other social media channels. In his entry, called The
