Here are some QEII facts I found interesting:

She has given out about 78,000 Christmas puddings to staff continuing the custom of

King George V and King George VI. In addition, the Queen gives all her staff a gift at Christmas time

Since 1952, she has conferred over 387,700 honours and awards.

Over the course of Her reign, around 1.1-million people have attended garden parties at Buckingham Palace or the Palace of Holyrood House

With the birth of Prince Andrew in 1960, Elizabeth became the first reigning Sovereign to have a child since Queen Victoria, who had her youngest child, Princess Beatrice, in 1857.

Elizabeth is patron of more than 620 charities and organizations.

It may be almost a week late and not the day that is celebrated as her birthday however, the Queen's birthday was April 21 so, Happy Birthday Your Majesty! She's really pretty amazing.
