Hundreds oppose planned cell tower

More than 245 people to date have signed an online petition in opposition to a cell tower proposed for the Sheridan Nurseries property in Norval.

Bell Mobility Inc. has plans to put a 40-metre (131-ft.) telecommunications tower on the south side of the property located at 9674 Winston Churchill Blvd.

The company has entered into a lease agreement with Sheridan Nurseries for the tower, which will be finalized if it's approved by Industry Canada.

"In order to improve network performance, Bell is seeking to add a telecommunications facility comprising of a tower and associated equipment shelter in the Halton Hills area," said Omar Lababidi, of Standard Land Company, in an information package about the tower to the Town of Halton Hills. Standard Land Company is representing Bell Mobility in the land use consultation for the tower.
