- Historically, the holiday celebrated the end of slavery. The Slavery Abolition Act 1833 came into effect August 1, 1834, officially ending slavery in the British Empire.
- Celebrated the first Monday in August, the Civic Holiday goes by different names in different provinces: British Columbia Day, Saskatchewan Day, New Brunswick Day. Nunavut, Manitoba, PEI and the Northwest Territories simply call it Civic Holiday, while in Ontario it's unofficially known as Simcoe Day, named after...
- ...John Graves Simcoe, the first Lieutenant Governor of Upper Canada (now known as Ontario), who ended slavery in Upper Canada long before it was abolished in the rest of the British Empire. He also founded York (now Toronto) and helped establish law and order in the area.
- Instead of Simcoe Day, some towns in Ontario host celebrations named after local historical figures. Ottawa celebrates Colonel By Day, Burlington is home to Joseph Brant Day, Guelph has John Galt Day and Hamilton holds George Hamilton Day (no, not the orange guy).

I don't know if these facts will help me remember the Civic Holiday (which, for the record, is August 6 this year), but at least I know why I have that Monday off.
