Teams trade 3-2 wins

New-look Jr. A Raiders split opening games with Blades

The Georgetown Raiders' newfound youth movement began in earnest over the weekend with a 3-2 win and a 3-2 loss against the Oakville Blades in Ontario Junior Hockey League regular-season action.

Usually one of the more-experienced teams in the OJHL, the Raiders, who had the league's best regular-season record last season on the way to winning the West Division title, had just two 20-year-olds in their lineup on the weekend and several youngsters making the jump from the minor hockey ranks to the Jr. A level.

Purchased by Burlington industrialist Bill Court during the summer, the Georgetown franchise has undergone a near-complete makeover, with the expected growing pains evident for a team filled with talented prospects.

"Obviously, we're going to be a young team and we're trying to get some local kids in here who are driven to go to the NCAA for scholarships," said third-year head coach and general manager Greg Walters.

"It's going to take some time as a coach to see what your players are capable of doing, but this team has the potential to develop some exciting young players. Oakville is in the same situation we are."

Both weekend contests were at times scrambles but neither team enjoyed a two-goal lead at any time. First-line winger Drake Hart, a 19-year-old from Cayuga, netted the winner late in Friday's game in

Oakville, finishing off a 3-on-2 with vets Brendan Woods and Nick Perruccio getting the assists.

Hart had two goals on the evening and rookie Nicholas Dozzi of Stoney Creek had the other.

At home on Saturday, the Raiders led 2-1 at the game's midway point, but a pair of soft goals chased starting netminder Gabe Grunwald and the Blades held on for the one-goal victory.

Woods had both Raider goals, with Georgetown resident Todd Bannerman earning an assist on the second Oakville tally.

Next up for the Raiders is a road date Friday against the Toronto Lakeshore Patriots in Etobicoke. Georgetown's next home date is on Wednesday, Sept. 19 against the Hamilton Red Wings.

line over the weekend. The 5-foot-9, 160-pound Halton Hurricanes' product is the lone Halton Hills' resident to crack the roster...The Raiders have a pair of brother tandems on this year's roster. Drake Hart's 17-year-old sibling Davis didn't play on the weekend, while 19-year-old blueliner Alex Adams was acquired in a trade with the Orangeville Flyers in exchange for defender Geoff Bagnall. Seventeen-year-old forward John Adams had an assist for the Raiders in Saturday's loss...Last year's playoff and regular-season MVP, Tyson Fawcett, along with another key contributor up front, Jacob Bauchman, apparently don't fit in with the Raiders' youth push and are at home in Barrie waiting to be dealt.
