### Do not place electronics at the curb as garbage or bulk waste - they will not be collected.

#### Electronics

- Answering machines
- Cassette players
- · Computers (CPUs, laptops, notebooks, all-in-ones, etc.)
- Computer monitors
- Computer accessories (keyboards, mice, external drives, etc.)
- CD players
- DVD players
- Fax machines
- Phones (cordless, cell, rotary, wired, etc.)
- Printers and desktop copiers
- Radios
- Scanners
- Speakers
- Stereos
- Televisions
- VCRs

Electronics contain recyclable materials such as steel, glass, copper, aluminum, plastic and lead, and should not be placed in the landfill.

Electronics Recycling Drop-off Options

Unwanted electronics can be dropped off for recycling at the Halton Waste Management Site, 5400 Regional Road 25, Milton, for no charge (up to five items per load). The Halton Waste Management Site is open Monday to Saturday, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m.



Many retailers take back electronic waste for recycling. Recycle Your Electronics is an Ontario Electronic Stewardship program that ensures materials remain within North America and are safely recycled. Visit

### POLICE BEAT

#### Volvo vandalized

A Volvo parked in a driveway on Dublin Line was vandalized during the day last Friday when trim was ripped off the rear driver's side door by unknown persons. Damage is pegged at approximately \$500.

Help yourself

It wasn't a Happy Canada Day for the owners of three unlocked vehicles that were broken into overnight on the July 1 while parked on Peel Street. A Garmin GPS, an iPod Touch, an iPhone and loose change were stolen with the losses estimated over \$500.

Drug raid

A drug raid on a Delrex Boulevard residence netted Halton police \$16,000 worth of assorted drugs and resulted in the arrests of two Georgetown men who have been charged with 11 counts.

With help from the Guns and Gangs unit, District One Criminal Investigation Bureau officers executed a search warrant at the residence on Friday, and seized marijuana, hashish, cocaine, MDMA and methamphetamine.

An 18-year-old is charged with one count of trafficking a controlled substance and five counts of possession for the purpose of trafficking. A 22-year-old is charged with five counts of possession for the purpose of trafficking. Both were held for a bail hearing.
