Green Building standards

With some developers in Halton Hills "more supportive than others" when it comes to implementing the Town's proposed Green Building Standards, Town councillors favour gradual phase-in of new rules to ensure development and communities are more efficient, healthy and active. The Standards will deal with water and energy conservation, air quality, waste

management and transportation/community design.

In a briefing to Town Council last Monday, consultant Lorelei Jones offered options for the Town to follow to ensure developers are addressing the Green Building Standards. Option one, which was favoured by Council, initially calls for the Town to require at the Building Permit stage, proof, but not formal verification, that builders install

chosen features identified in a Green Building Standards checklist. The plan is to gradually shift to option four, which calls for builders to submit proof for all criteria they intend to install in their development, and during the development process, the Town will require an audit of several criteria for compliance.

Jones said while the homebuyer will pay the initial costs for developers to implement criteria from the checklist – for example, low-flush toilets - there would be lower costs due to the energy efficiency of checklist items. Jones suggested the Town should use a carrot and stick approach to getting developer compliance, leading Regional/ Ward Two Councillor

Jane Fogal to comment that they know developers will have some issues with the new Standards she suggested they use a "more carrot than stick" approach to implementation, going slowly with a very gradual phase-in approach.

Disaster relief

The Town will provide a donation of \$1,000 to the City of Thunder Bay Disaster Relief Committee to help with clean up efforts following extensive flooding in May. In two hours, more rain fell than normal for a month, causing \$15 to \$20-million in damage.

In suggesting Council make the donation, Mayor Rick Bonnette noted that the Town's money would be matched by provincial funds.
