school to be built in an area where there are very few children.


So the plan is to build a school at the end of a dead end street in a community with severely taxed water resources and an aged population with few school age children? Why choose a location where the majority of children will need to be bussed in? Why not build a school in the young community, with many young families, east of Hwy 7? Noble Ridge is a new development and a school should have been incorporated in the plan. Was this not considered?
