See No Evil, Hear No Evil can probably be counted as one of the lamest comedies to come out in a long, long time.

The film, which stars Gene Wilder and Richard Pryor, has Wilder playing Dave Lyons, a deaf shopkeeper who hires a blind employee named Wally Kew (Pryor). Pretty funny gimmick, huh?

Yeah, I'm still wiping away the tears of laughter. But hold on - it gets even *funnier*. Turns out they both witness a murder ... well, sort of. Dave vaguely sees the murderer and Wally hears the gunshot. So together, the cops figure they're the felons and arrest them both.

So it's up to a deaf man handcuffed to a blind man to escape from police custody and clear their names by bringing the real criminals to justice.

Well, maybe, just maybe, (and that's a small maybe) there was some sort of good idea in this movie. But with five screenwriters on this film, it clearly got clouded

over with very unfunny material and is probably very close to being some of the worst work Wilder and Pryor have ever done.

Too bad, because we've come to expect funny stuff from the duo and Wilder and Pryor fans will be gravely disappointed.

It came down to the point that to cover over some of the really bad writing (it was like an eighth grade remedial English class wrote this), Pryor had to resort to, more than his usual, saying "f---" every other

word to somehow make people laugh.

It just comes out as crude and rude - not funny.

Pryor and Wilder, who together have made some very successful films - Silver Streak, Stir Crazy - should've waited for a better film to reunite for.

The only person who would enjoy this film would probably be someone who's both blind and deaf.

Out of 10, See No Evil, Hear No Evil rates a four.
