Surely the object of the system is to teach the kids the skills and tactics of the game whilst, very importantly, giving them fun and exercise. Fun and exercise will not be achieved whilst sitting on the bench. There is substitution allowed and there are set times, locally, for substitution. Huge scores can be run up when one team has a full (plus) squad and the other has less than the comple-

> Players sign up or are signed up and then drafted to teams. It is not possible to have a full history of the player, with holiday times etc., in the profile. Coaches change with the age groups and the new man or woman will have a hard time choosing players.

> On the other hand, the competitive team coach is restricted to the players chosen for the duration of the season. There are, of course, circumstances allowing changes. However, each player registered as rep can be quite costly when changes are made to the roster.

I believe all players should register to play in the club system, and play where the clubs feel fit. I also believe that the representative teams should be just as the word implies. Players should be chosen when they are able to play, based on merit, at the time the games are scheduled. Just as national teams are chosen, or provincial for that matter. The squad should be interchangeable as required by form, injury, availability etc.

South America, Brazil in particular, has given us much exciting soccer in the past 40 years or so. Hopefully, the newest trend will not catch on. A couple of players, now playing in Sweden, assaulted a referee during a recent game. The referee was left unconscious for a brief time after being kicked in the head. Four players were arrested in the full incident. In recent years, the violence attached to the game has been confined to the "fans" and, although rising in England, has moved around other European centers, sadly.

It is probably a sign of modern times which we live in, generally. Violence is the modern-day curse.

After finishing second in the first \$48,320 elimination of the Maple Leaf Trot to Mathers Streak, who set the initial world record of 1:56.2 for aged trotting geldings aon a fiveeights mile track, it was Waples' turn to upstage Mathers Streak and Rick "The Whip" Zeron.

And they did jsut that. As the field of fine-tuned trotters left the wings of the starting gate Waples had No Sex Please out and gunning for the lead with Mathers Streak hot on the trail. He took the field to a quarter in :28.1.

Just past the quarter Zeron pulled Mathers Streak out and the pair duelled to the half in :56.1. Mathers went the long mile on the outside, getting the lead for a few brief strides before No Sex Please gained momentum and accosted the lead for a 1:25.3 three-quarter mile station.

At the head of the stretch the two still battled it out but it was No Sex Please who trotted faster, stronger and was the best on the night, breaking beam in 1:56.2 for driver Ron Waples. Lodestar Lobell, who sat in the pocket third for most of the mile, finished second and Incredible MA was third. The 1:56.2 clocking tied the world record for aged trotting geldings on a fiveeights mile track which was set only races prior by Mathers Streak.

The win was especially sweet for Stoneham, Sandy Chapman and Ron Waples. No Sex Please is pitcher Turpin all fielded well. Ryan trained and owned by his son, Ron

Waples, 25, returns to University of Guelph in the fall for the second and final year of a diploma agriculture program. But for the rest of the summer he's hot to trot, training horses on his farm in Rockwood.

The win was the fifth in 25 season starts for No Sex Please and the victory boosted his bankroll to \$273,260 for the year. Completing the order of finish in
