

One per cent milk soon on market

Ontario's dairy product market will soon be introducing one per cent milk to the consumers.

The Ontario Farm Products Marketing Commission has filed regulations which will become effective April 30 permitting the sale of one per cent milk.

The Ontario Milk Marketing Board (OMMB) responded to a hearing called by the Commission in late February to present its proposal for two new classes for fluid milk - one per cent and skim. This would give a total of three fluid milk classes.

Milk from Ontario farms averages about 3.9 per cent butterfat and when milk is standardized to make homogenized (3.25%), 2%, 1% or skim milk (0.1%), the skimmed off butterfat displaces industrial milk production and reduces the overall size of the market. This effectively reduces producer income and that's why the Board wants new classes to offset those losses and to maintain producer income.

New classes for skim and one per cent would give the OMMB the opportunity to set different prices within the fluid market. Milk going into these two classes will have more value to processors because the skim-off cream can be used to make other products.
