Canada's greatest eight year old athlete - a harness horse by the name of TAKE A LOOK, paced to his sixth consecutive victory Sunday night at Mohawk Raceway in a

Canadian season's record of 1:54.3 in a \$24,000 Free For All pace.

The win was his eighth in 12 starts this year and boosted his bankroll to \$170,250 making him North America's leading moneywinning harness horse in 1990 thus far.

Trained and driven by Roger Mayotte (who is also part-owner) for owners mabel Fraser, Phyllis Warriner and Early Bird Stables of Mississauga, the eight year old son of Most Happy Fella has become a fan-favourite on the Ontario Jockey Club circuit - partly because of his talent and success and partly because of his age.

Race horses as the norm hoes just aren't supposed to peak on the track at the ripe old age of eight. Try telling that to trainer/driver Roger Mayotte about his pacing wonder TAL and he'll only smile and shake his head.

Mayotte had a lot of company Sunday night as Take A Look's latest performance lift all the fans at Mohawk shaking their heads in dis-

"He's just amazing me," laughed Mayotte, "he did all the work out there, and he's just so relaxed on the outside; he just waits for me to tell him what to do."


