There is no charge to obtain a "We are appealing to the public burning permit, he adds. However, under the Ontario Fire Code, a person can be subject to a fine up to \$2,000 if a permit is not obtained before burning outdoors.

> "If the weather conditions pose a serious problem for outdoor burning, such as it being too dry, then we may be in a position to revoke the permits from a fire safety point of view," Cunningham says.

> Over the past couple of weeks the fire department has been called out to several grass fires. Although most haven't caused serious amounts of damage, except where barns or other structures have become involved, the time factor puts a strain on the fire department.

"We have in the past experienced serious structural fires as a result of grass fires," Cunningham says. "Damage to buildings such as barns, or even fences, can be costly from these fires. It is also tough on our resources when we get two or three of these calls at the same time.
