Early Saturday morning the groups of youngsters, accompanied by parents and leaders, trekked along a marked trail and gathered in an open field. It was on this old pasture land that the Boy Scouts of Canada initiated their first pilot project of enhancing wildlife habitat by not only planting the usual coniferous seedlings but hundreds of wildlife shrubs as well. The two major components, food and cover, were provided for proper wildlife management.

1990 marked the 18th year for Trees for Canada and since the National Council approved this promising program in 1973, approximately 40 million tree seedlings have been planted by Ontario's future conservationists. The program was first established generally to help reforest Canada's depleting timber resources by reclaiming fields no longer under cultivation and patching up old logging sites. More than \$800,000 was donated towards the greening of our country, with close to one million people supporting the Trees for Canada program in 1989.

As the Wildlife Habitat Facilitator for the Ontario Federation of Anglers and Hunters, working in conjunction with Wildlife Habitat Canada, I had a chance to meet with Ben Kruser, the National Program Director of the Boy Scouts of Canada, to have the two conservation groups working together cooperatively on a mutually beneficial project—such as wildlife habitat enhancement. We decided that leaders should promote the planting of wildlife shrubs and additional tree species to provide a much more 'diverse' habitat to spring planting sites.

It was stated in November of 1989 by Jacques Moreillon, Secretary General of the World Scout Bureau, that during the period from April 1, 1990 to August 31, 1991 the World Scout Committee had decided to declare "World Scout Environment Year." Along with the environmental concerns recognized by the committee as requiring urgent attention such as: global warming, destruction of the ozone layer, deforestation, increasing use of chemicals and environment, this 'enrichment' to the Trees for Canada program will increase the awareness of the loss wildlife habitat and desertification of agricultural lands, subjecting these issues to intense discussion, debate and action during this special year.



Next year Mr. Lanouette plans to open up his property to junior conservationists to further enhance his land for wildlife.


Projects for constructing nesting boxes for kestrils, bluebirds, and screech owls and perching posts will be provided for hawks.


