Their first game was on Friday evening against St. Catharines. As the visitors, Firestone struck quickly for two runs in the first inning. Successive walks to Shannon Morris and Kelly Ambrose set the stage for Tracy Hagan, who cashed both runners with a double.

After St. Catharines tied it in their half, Firestone took the lead in the top of the second, on Deanna Louth's first home run of the year. It was 3-2.

Sherie Peacock led off with a wrong-field double to right. Louth gained base on an error and stole second. Hannah grounded out to drive in one run, and Korzack hit a sacrifice fly to drive in the second. Keri Vandevalk worked a walk, and Lisa Harlow gained base on an error. On a three and two pitch, Morris belted a double over the left-fielder's head to cash both runners and tie the score.

The game remained tied until the bottom of the last inning, when Cawthra manufactured a run to win the game, 5-4. Although giving up only one run over four innings, Ambrose was charged with the loss.

For their dinner-time match, the Hoosiers met up with the strong Haldimand team. Continuing their good play in the previous game, the Hoosiers jumped into a quick 2-0 lead in the bottom of the first. Successive singles by Morris, Ambrose and Hagan produced one run, with the other scored on an error.

Haldimand scored four runs in the second to gain the lead, 4-2. But Firestone came right back. Vandevalk led off with a walk. Morris lined a triple to the gap in right-centre to cut their lead in half. Ambrose then singled Morris home and the game was tied. One out later, Tammy Richard doubled home the go-ahead run. Hoosiers led 5-4.

Firestone added an insurance marker one inning later to make it 6-4, when Korzack gained base on an error, stole second, and was driven home by Morris' third hit of the game.

The final score was 6-4. Ambrose picked up the victory, in relief of Richard, allowing no runs over three innings.

The Firestone squad now has a week off, before participating in yet another tournament, this one in Fergus.
