200 want meeting on trunk sewer expansion

A petition requesting a special meeting be called to permit a full discussion on the proposed Silver Creek sanitary trunk sewer expansion in Georgetown was presented to Halton Region chairman Peter Pomeroy Wednesday.

Over 200 residents signed the petition although it had only been

circulated for two days.

Residents signing say they are opposed to plans for the twinning of the trunk line through Silver Creek Valley in Georgetown because of its designation as an environmentally sensitive/significant area by both the Region and the Credit Valley Conserva-

tion Authority (CVCA). The Ministry of Natural Resources has also classified the Hungry Hollow Ravine as Wetlands Class 2.

The petition declares "we believe such activity will result in damage in this fragile valley area and request that a special meeting be called by the Region of Halton


for a full discussion of the proposal."

In a letter to the Region's chairman and councillors, the petitioners asked that every possible route for the trunk be explored before a decision is made for its location.

"We hope the (special) meet-

ing can be held in Georgetown with Region staff and representatives of the consulting engineering firms present."

Those presenting the petition declared they were well received and a tentative proposal for a meeting in September was suggested.



Daring daylight robberies strike rural homes

Halton Regional Police believe a series of daylight house entries - two in Halton Hills, one in Milton - are related and may have been planned.

The first entry took place between 7 a.m and 7 p.m. Monday at a residence near the intersection of Five Sdrd. and the Fifth Line.

The culprit kicked-in a locked

kitchen door and then removed a television, a VCR and some jewelry. The property was worth \$2,100.

On Tuesday, two residences on 15 Sdrd. were entered more than \$9,000 worth of property was removed.

The first house, located west of Hwy. 25, was entered through an

unlocked door between 9:30 a.m. and noon. The culprit also entered a shed near the residence.

A stereo was removed from the house while a chainsaw and tool box were removed from the shed. The property was worth about \$1,600.

The greatest dollar loss hap-

pened at a residence located near the Sixth Line, Milton.

More than \$7,600 worth of property, including a pair of VCRs, a computer, a stereo and a microwave oven, was removed after the culprit entered the house through a ground floor window. According to police, there was no sign of a forced entry.
