

Harmony Bull transfers to rehabilitation centre

In one of the first major steps in her recovery Harmony Bull has left Sunnybrook Medical Centre and moved into a bed at the Hugh MacMillan Rehabilitation Centre.

The 17-year-old McIntyre Cres. girl moved into the world renowned rehabilitation facility July 12.

In an interview early this month, Harmony said that she was looking forward to the move because "the next step is home."

Doctors expect Harmony will be at Hugh MacMillan for the next three or four months.

Blue Sears duffel coat could lead police to Lynda Shaw's killer

Ontario Provincial Police investigators are hoping a dark blue duffel coat found near Lynda Shaw's body will lead them to her killer.

According to police, the dark blue hooded fabric coat has a "unique, predominantly blue, plaid woollen lining", an inside zipper and imitation bone toggles that fasten through leather loops on the outside.

The size 42 regular coat probably belonged to a man of average height (5'8" to 5'10") and build, police said. The coat, bearing the label, "Sears - The Men's Store," was one of about 1,250 sold by the company between 1977 and 1980.

Investigators have received a flood of calls about the coat since it was released to the public last week.

Shaw, 21, was last seen alive at about 11 p.m. Sunday, April 15 when she left her parents house to return for final exams at the University of Western Ontario.

Her body was found in a swampy area off Hwy. 401 just east of the Middlesex-Oxford County Line. A post mortem determined that she died of multiple injuries, including stab wounds.

Georgetown man heads Halton North NDP party

Halton North New Democrats will have a new face representing them when the next provincial election is called.

Georgetown resident Noel Duignan was acclaimed to replace long-time candidate Fern Wolf as the New Democratic Party's representative at a nomination meeting in Milton Tuesday.

In his acceptance speech to about 30 party faithful, Duignan attacked David Peterson's Liberal government and Halton North MPP Walt Elliot for "selling out this province to their big money friends."

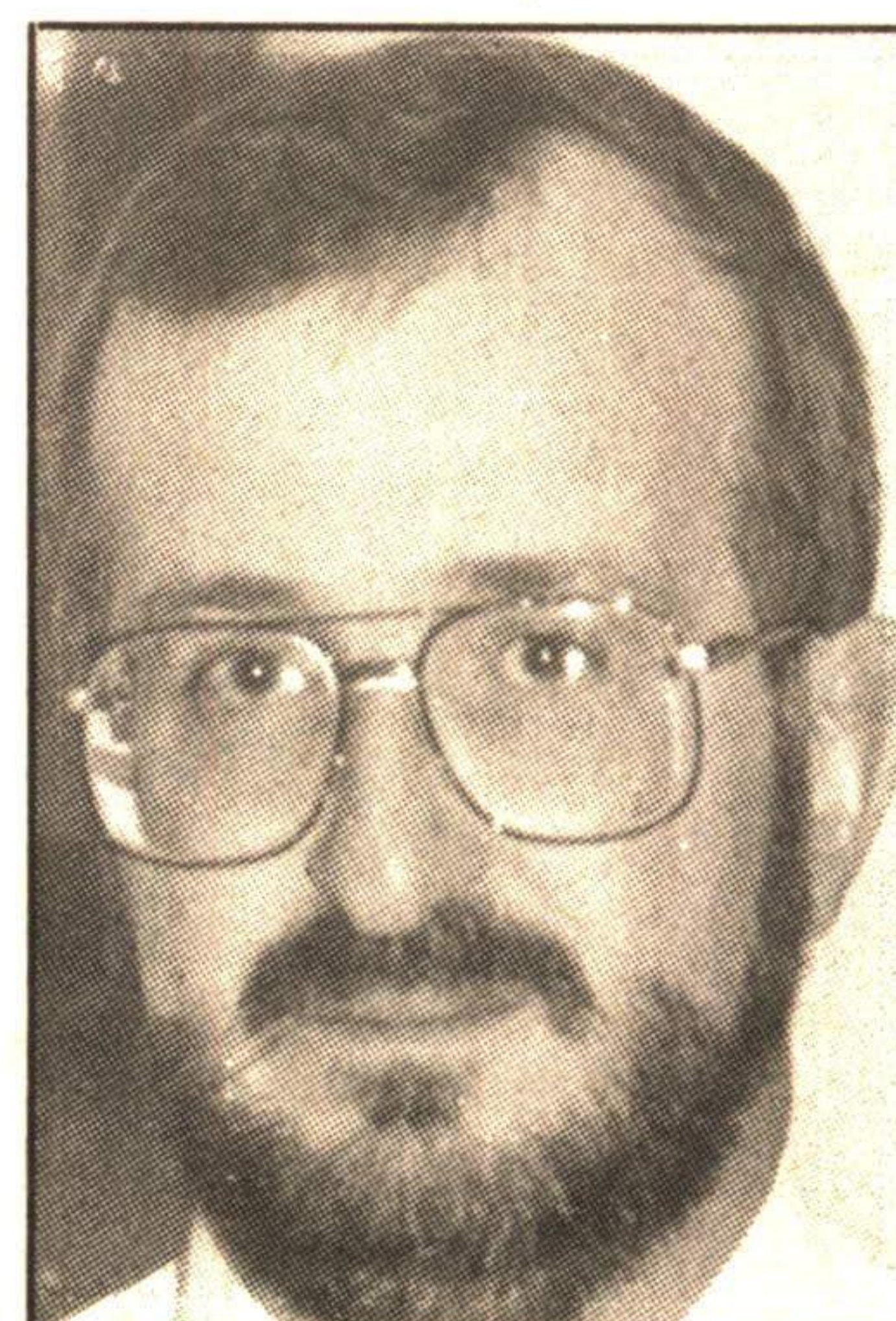
He said while government has "grabbed billions of dollars in extra taxes since 1985," it has not increased taxes to "the big and powerful."

"Banks go untouched, no new capital tax, no new corporate tax rates," Duignan said. "In fact in this year's budget, the Peterson Liberals gave their friends an extra \$140 million by reducing their taxes even more."

He added "working people and small businesses who cannot afford it, are paying for this corporate welfare."

Duignan, a father of four is a consultant for Homestarts Incorporated a Mississauga based co-operative and non-profit housing company.

He said the government "lacks

the courage to set its own fiscal direction and agenda" opting instead to "continue with the former Tory administration fiscal policies."

Duignan said the Liberals "are more interested in keeping their money happy friends happy than in having an environment friendly economy."

He said "the people and the environment are losers" because the Liberals "have continued with the environmental abuses that have plagued Ontario over the past decade."

Among the abuses, the Niagara Escarpment "being overrun" by quarries, the clear cutting of forests and a continuing garbage crisis.

"The Liberals have no vision of an alternative economic system that

serves human needs," Duignan said. "Their horizon is the corporate bottom line."

He added that New Democrats "can and will" strive toward "an environmentally sustainable economy."

Duignan also took shots at the Liberals' social reform policies which "time and time again...have ignored those in need."

"Continued Liberal hypocrisy means that the disabled, the homeless and others in need...suffer," Duignan said.

"As New Democrats we believe people matter more than the powerful private interest groups," he said. "Together during (the expected) election campaign we will fight to make sure that the people of this riding count...and come election night, we will send Mr. Elliot into early retirement."

Liberal MPP Walt Elliot will seek re-election facing Conservative Dave Whiting, Duignan and Guiseppe Gori of the Family Coalition Party.

Political analysts believe Premier Peterson could call an election this fall. He has until 1993 to call the election.

Severance permitted for Denny tree farm

Halton Region will not contest a land severance granted to Harold and Audrey Denny of RRI Acton.

Regional Council Wednesday rejected a recommendation by its planning and public works committee and voted 12-6 to drop plans to appeal the severance before the Ontario Municipal Board.

The decision runs counter to a Regional policy that grants

severances only to "bona fide" farmers — those whose prime income derives from farming and supports a farm family.

The severance, approved unanimously by the Land Division Committee May 1, enables the Dennys to continue a 14-year old reforestation project.
