

## Police beat

### False theft

Halton Regional Police have charged a 22-year-old Georgetown man with mischief after someone reported a theft that apparently did not take place. Police received a report that a vehicle was damaged and its stereo removed when the car was parked outside a Mountainview Rd. house Wednesday night.

When police investigated the incident, they discovered no theft had occurred. The man is set to appear in court August 22.

### Tools taken

Halton Regional Police are investigating the theft of about \$900 worth of tools from a Mountainview Rd., N., demolition site sometime last weekend. The equipment included wheelbarrows, sledgehammers and crow-bars.

### Property stolen

More than \$1,400 worth of property, including a CB radio, sunglasses, baseball equipment and cassette tapes, was removed from a van parked on Church St., Acton Sunday night. Police say the culprit entered the 1986 Chevrolet Astro van through a rear door.

### Cash grabbed

Between \$700 and \$800 cash, beer and some fruit juice was

taken from a Guelph St. restaurant sometime Tuesday night. The restaurant was entered after a rock was thrown through a window allowing the culprit to reach inside and lock the door. The investigation continues.

### Locks pried

A pair of sheds located on the Fifth Line near 10 Sdrd. were entered early Monday morning after the locks securing them were pried open. Police say engine oil,

antifreeze and a pair of chainsaws were among the \$740 worth of property removed.

### Storm problems

Tuesday night's sudden thunderstorm set off an alarm at a Rosetta St. business in Georgetown. Firefighters responded to the scene but found no damage. Shortly after that a tree on the 10th Conc. south of Georgetown was struck by lightning. No injuries were reported.

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## MUPPETS, DICK TRACY HEAD CAST OF CHARACTERS BRINGING STAGES ALIVE WITH NEW WALT DISNEY WORLD SHOWS THIS SUMMER

Lake Buena Vista, Fla. And in the all-new Epcot Center resort area, two of the world's most entertaining hotels, the Walt Disney World Swan and Dolphin, are now open.

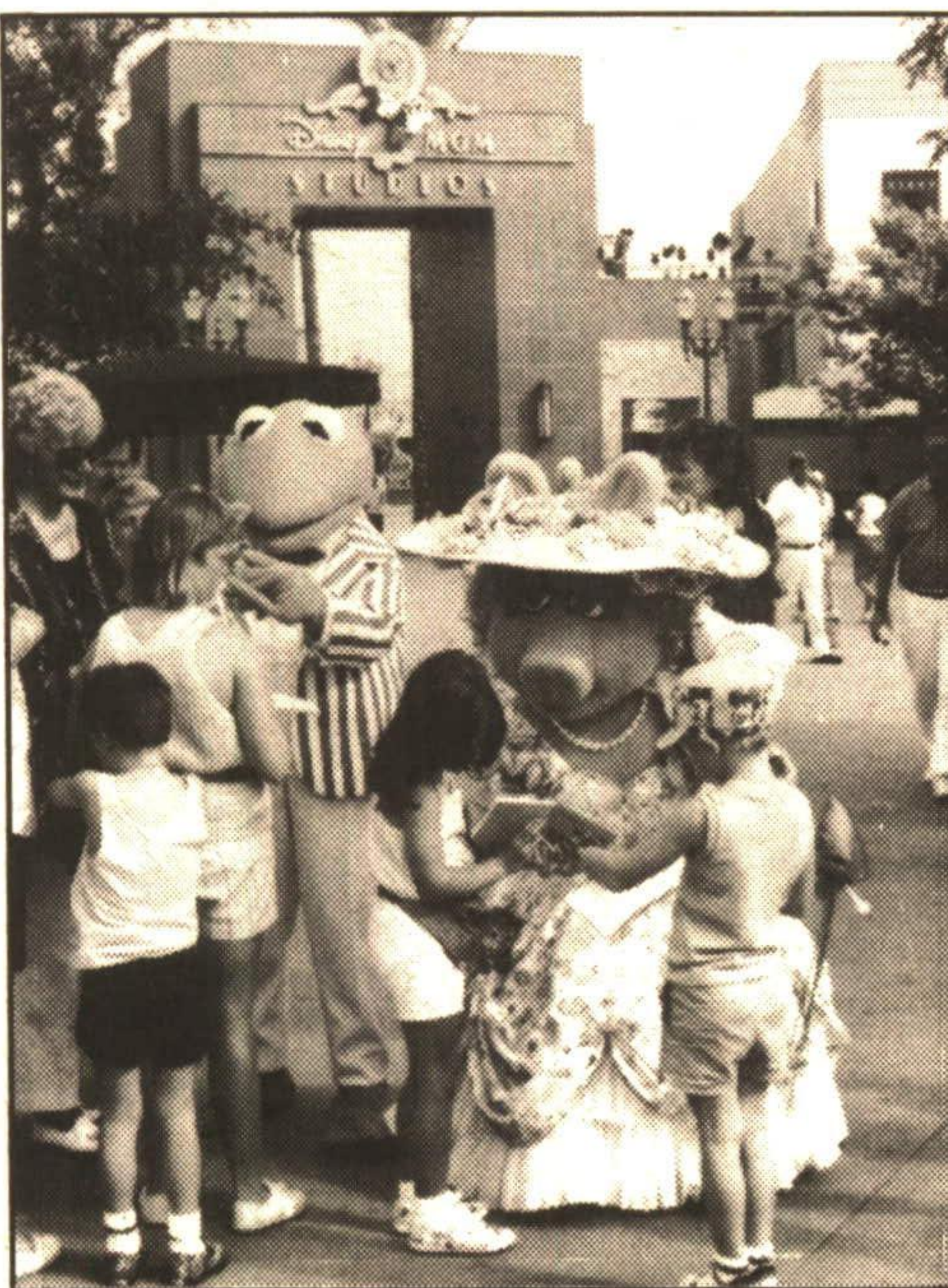

In the musical extravaganza, Kermit the Frog, Miss Piggy, Fozzie Bear, Gonzo and The Electric Mayhem Band star in a musical party that ranges from Miss Piggy's boisterous version of "Personality" to Kermit's emotion-filled rendition of "It's Not Easy Being Green." The whole cast joins in a rousing chorus of "Shout" for the finale.

Inspired by the "Dick Tracy" film starring Warren Beatty, "Dick Tracy Starring in Diamond Double Cross" is an arresting and high-powered musical staged nightly at the Studios Theme Park. It uses make-up magic to introduce such overlords of the make-believe underworld as Brow, Pruneface, Mumbles and the Blank in a face-off with Dick Tracy. Breathless Mahoney and the Ritz girls dance up a storm across the skyscraper skyline at the Theater of the Stars.

Studio Soundstage One is busy with audience-participation production fun. Lucky guests may get to choose what's behind Door No. 1...2...or 3 in a new version of the TV game show classic "Let's Make A Deal." Being produced by dick clark productions inc. for airing on NBC-TV,

the new "Deal" features a new host, Bob Hilton, and contestants chosen from the studio audience of visitors to the Disney-MGM Studios Theme Park. The game show happens throughout every day to entertain guests.

By night, the sky above the Studios Theme Park comes alive with pyrotechnical magic during performances of Sorcery in the Sky. Towering 55 feet above the spires of the Chinese Theatre, an inflatable version of Mickey Mouse as the Sorcer-

er's Apprentice fires magical sparks with his giant finger. The show celebrates the music of "Fantasia" plus many other famous motion pictures. Choreographed to the music are more than 300 bursts of fireworks.

Donatello, Raphael, Leonardo and Michelangelo--collectively the Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles that have captured youthful imaginations--make daily appearances at Monahan's Freight Co. on the backlot at the Studios Theme Park. Their routine includes a musical number sung by their news reporter friend, April O'Neil, plus plenty of action-photo opportunities for their fans.

Meanwhile, in the Magic Kingdom, the young and young-at-heart are treated to popular TV brought to life with the premiere of "Mickey's Magical TV World" in Mickey's Starland (being renamed from Mickey's Birthdayland). "Mickey's Magical TV World" features the stars of the animated television package "The Disney Afternoon"--"Chip 'n' Dale's Rescue Rangers," "Ducktales," "Talespin" and Gummi Bears--in a stage show capturing the magic which enralls children around the world.

At the Disney Village Marketplace, Pleasure Island turns every evening into a gala New Year's Eve party with music and fun that spills out of the island's six themed clubs onto the brick-paved street with nightly fireworks and up-tempo dancing into the wee hours of the morning.

This is also the first summer season for the thrill-adventures to inner-space and outer-space--Body Wars at Epcot Center and Star Tours at the Studios Theme Park.

The Wonders of Life pavilion, presented by Metropolitan Life, showcases Body Wars, a twisting, turning, plunging journey through the human body using flight-simulator technology and stunning photographic images. The new Future World pavilion also features a sensitive yet humorous motion picture view of human birth, a show about stress management, street comedy, a fairground of fitness fun and nutritious goodies--all under a 100,000-square-foot golden dome.

Flight-simulator technology brings the out-

of-this-world thrills of George Lucas' "Star Wars" to the Disney-MGM Studios Theme Park in Star Tours, presented by M&M's Chocolate Candies. Guests become passengers aboard a Starspeeder spacecraft bound for the Moon of Endor in a hyperspeed adventure through space.

The Disney "resort kingdom's" newest landmark is the Walt Disney World Dolphin, a 1,509-room convention hotel joining the just-opened Walt Disney World Swan in the Epcot Resort Area which will add two more fantasy-themed hotels by year's end.

The opening of the Walt Disney World Dolphin in June completes the two-hotel architectural convention complex by post-modernist master Michael Graves. Operated by Sheraton, the Dolphin joins the 758-room Walt Disney World Swan, which opened in January and is operated by West-in Hotels and Resorts.

They are located just southwest of Epcot Center and are linked to the theme park by a new International Gateway to World Showcase. Guests of the hotels may enter Epcot Center at the new plaza, which is accessible by tram or a comfortable walk along a romantic boardwalk encircling a placid 25-acre lake.

Water taxis transport hotel guests to the Disney-MGM Studios Theme Park.

Later this year, two additional hotels comprising more than 1,200 rooms will open in the Epcot Resort Area. Disney's Yacht Club Resort (635 rooms) and Disney's Beach Club Resort (580 rooms) have been designed by noted architect Robert A.M. Stern to create a vacation adventure to turn-of-the-century New England seashores.

All three Walt Disney World theme parks are open daily throughout the year, with extended hours of operation during the summer and at other peak vacation times.

Pleasure Island and the Disney Village Marketplace are open daily with a variety of boutiques and restaurants. At 7 p.m., Pleasure Island becomes a nightclub theme park for adult singles, couples and groups. Persons under 18 must be accompanied by an adult.

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
