It stars Kiefer Sutherland as Nelson Wright, a renegade medical student whose fascination with after death exploration leads him to brew up an unprecedented experiment: Gathering together fellow student deviants, Nelson presents his plan to induce clinical death and then after expert-thrusted at you and you end up short-changed. The film attempts a more meaningful significance, but unfortunately gets diluted along the way. The same can be said for the individual characters, if they simply help him with the experiment. They reluctantly agree, although it's Rachel Manus (Julia Roberts) who puts up the most resistance, insisting imminent brain damage for her beloved partner. David Labrecque (Kevin Bacon), a maverick pragmatist and self-made expert in the field of death, also objects to the proceedings but soon does an about face and wholeheartedly embraces the experiment.

So after Nelson's success in regaining life, they all decide to take turns in visiting the great beyond. But soon they all start competing as to who can bravely remain 'dead' the longest and that's when things go astray. They
