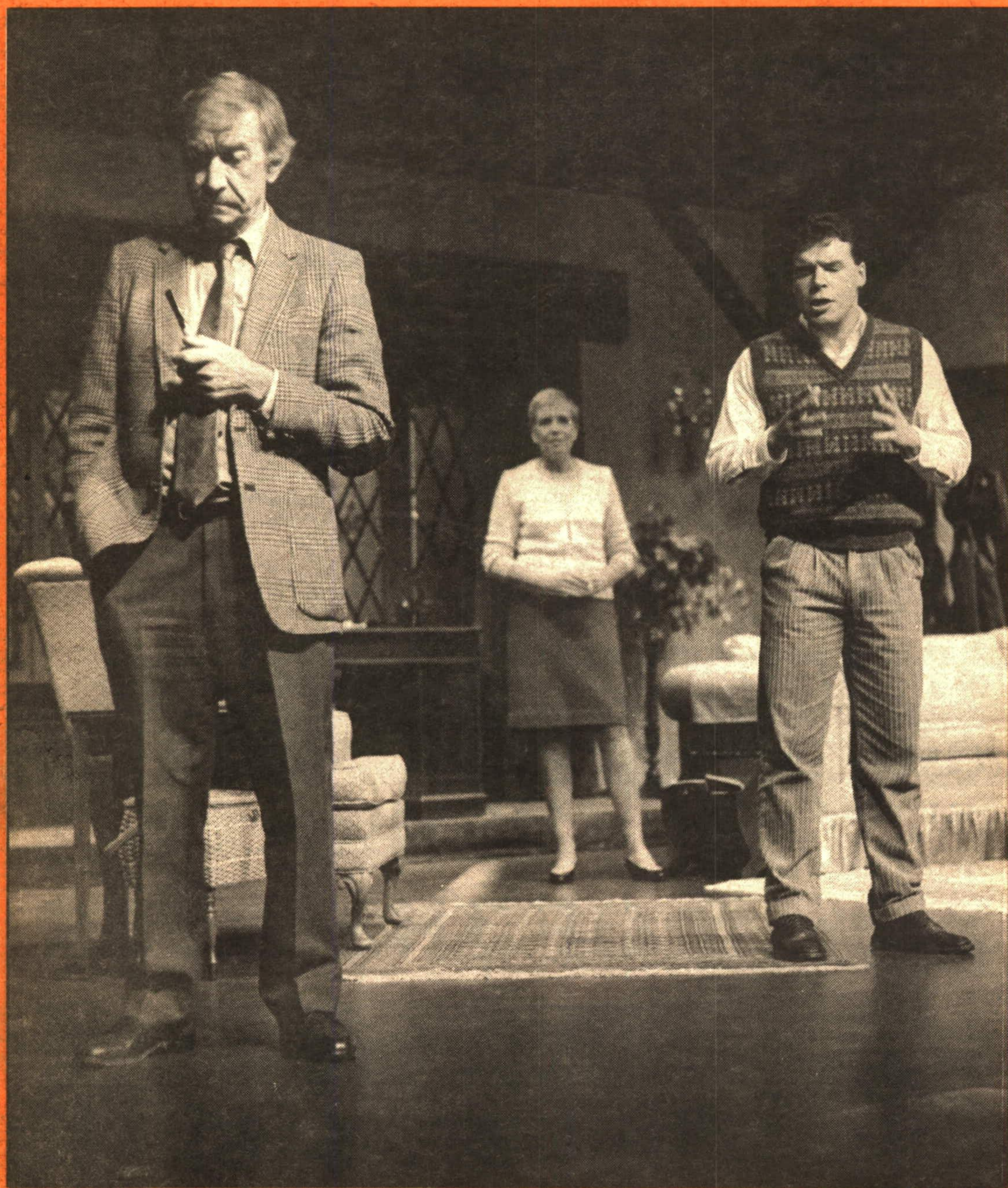

Pipe leak closes Acton Arena

A brine leak has resulted in the Acton Arena being closed until Wednesday.

"We figure what happened was through normal wear and tear the pipe broke down," Hay said.

A pipe containing brine burst Tuesday and to repair it arena staff had to dig through the ice surface and arena floor. So now the brine must be replaced, the air removed from the refrigeration system and the entire ice-making process started all over as the existing sheet is gone. Brine is a salt water solution which is the transferring agent which takes cold from the refrigeration unit to the floor.

The brine leak has forced the cancellation of ice events for the remainder of the week. That means a lot of rescheduling work for Acton's minor hockey groups, Acton Junior C Sabres and the local figure skating club.

Arena manager Al Hay figures all will be back to normal at the start

"We'll have to fit in our games somewhere, somehow," said Acton Minor Hockey Association president Kathi Williams. "It's one of those things you can never plan for and have to work around."

sometime next year. To tide them over, Peel has nominated a short term contingency site in Brampton to accept waste in the interim.

One site—on the Ninth Line between Britannia Road and south of Lower Base Line—borders Milton.

The province has agreed that such short term sites can go through a streamlined environmental hearing.

The other site—along Town Line north of the C.N.R. Tracks—is just east of Georgetown.

"As a result," states a staff report of Regional planning and public works committee, "we want to recommend to Peel Region that Halton residents who live in the vicinity of these two candidate areas and who may be affected if a landfill site is developed should be kept informed of the progress of the study and included in any public consultation activities."

Peel's dump selection process is in the earliest stages with several large areas singled out in the just-released consultant's report.

Halton Region staff is reviewing this document and will have a report at a later meeting on "the two candidate areas bordering Halton."

Peel expects to open its long term landfill in 1997.

Its existing landfill in Mississauga is expected to run out
