## Basketball squads end on losing note

The Acton High girls basketball teams ended their Halton County season on Tuesday afternoon with a couple of defeats. The Redmen juniors dropped a 62-18 decision to a powerful M.M. Robinson while the seniors lost a 50-38 match to the rival Georgetown Rebels.

For coach Anne Andrews this was a rebuilding year. The seniors finished up with a 1-9 record, after suspending the program for a year. The juniors, with 12 players returning next season, gained valuable experience that should help next season according to Andrews.

For the seniors the final contest of the year was one a solid effort. The first game of the season Acton fell 39-18 to Georgetown. They showed a marked improvement in losing 50-39, and even had the Rebels looking over their shoulders at halftime with the score 25-20.

Kelly Ambrose led the Redmen with a 16 point spree. Lisa Nadhazi chipped in 11 while Deanna Louth added nine.

The juniors finished off their

rebuilding year at 0-10, the last loss being a 62-18 loss to M.M. Robinson. Acton trailed 29-10 at halftime but couldn't find the hoop in the third quarter as M.M. Robinson netted 15 unanswered points.

Alana Clark scored eight points and Christina Trotter added four in the losing effort.

The juniors get one last chance at competition as they compete in their own Redmen Invitational Basketball tourney at Acton High on Saturday.

In an exhibition contest earlier in the week Acton fell 7-1 to Brampton with Jason McGuire getting the lone marker for the Canadian Tire team.

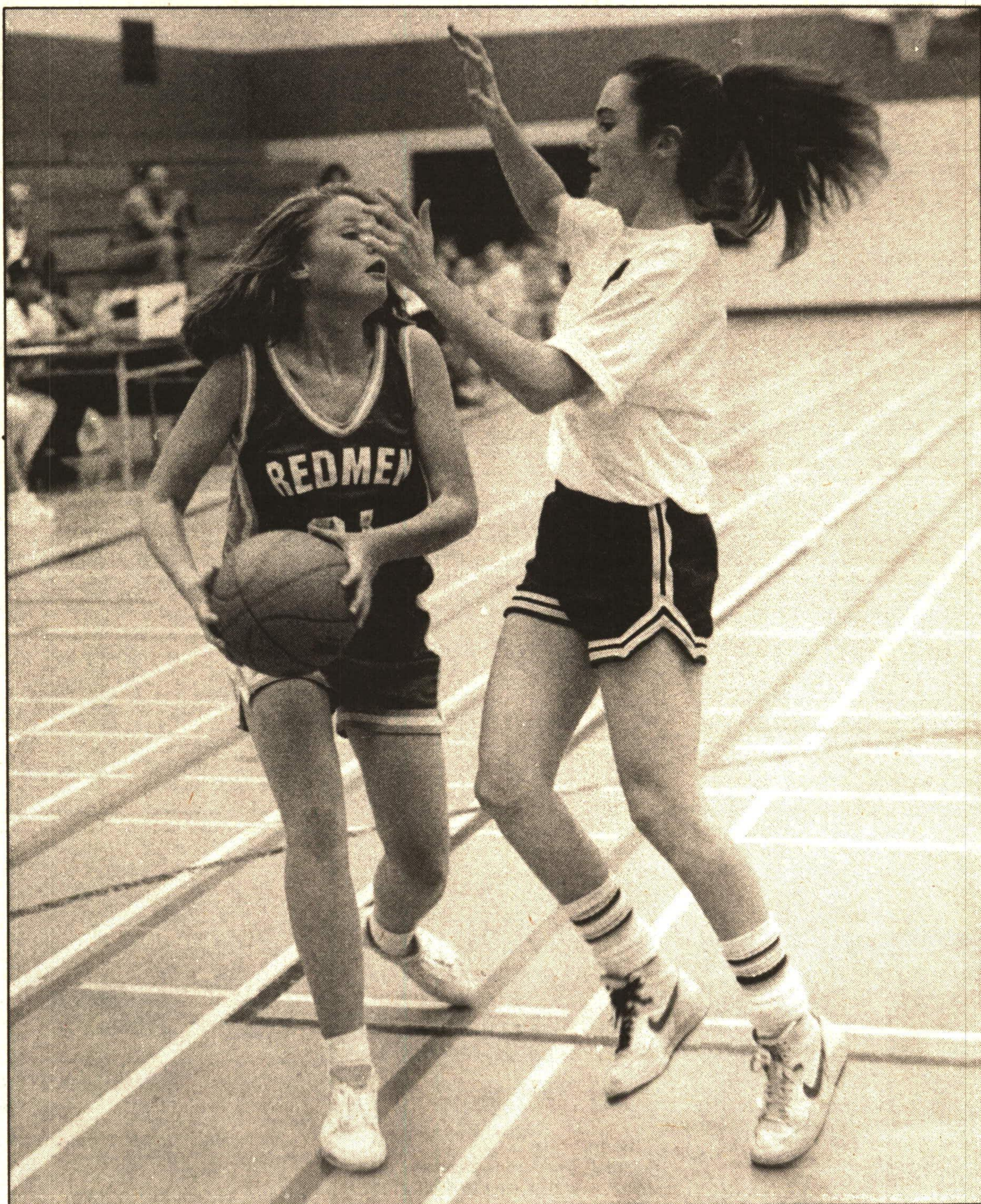
coach Carson Mininch is convinced the team is capable of beating every team in the league.

Travelling to Barrie on Friday night for a 7 p.m. start, the weary eight year olds once again ran out of gas in the third period, as Barrie scored three unanswered goals to earn a 6-3 win. The home side opened the scoring mid-way through the first period, but 70 seconds later, Joel Petkoff scored for The Hurricanes on a play set up by Mike Austen. Barrie took a

2-1 lead going into the second period, scoring with 40 seconds left in the first stanza.

The legionaires fought back midway through the second, when once again the combination of Petkoff from Austen scored to make it 2-2. Barrie scored a minute and a half later to once again take the lead at 3-2. Barrie had the legs for the third period, however, outshooting Halton by an 8-5 margin, and outscoring them 3-0, as several second chance goals were poked in behind goaltender Garrett Lau-

zon. The Hurricanes outshot Barrie 8-5 over the first two periods.

The Legion Branch 120 boys returned home for a Saturday afternoon rematch at Alcott Arena, posting a 3-2 win and bringing their season's record to 3-4 after seven games.

Joshua Tataryn opened the scoring for the Hurricanes late in the first period, on passes from Mike Knoepfli and Brydon Butterworth. Barrie tied the score early in the second period before Tataryn made it 2-1 with his second goal assisted by Joel Petkoff.
