# School board wants 8.5% more money

It'll take \$21.7 million more - an 8.5 per cent increase - to keep the Halton Board of Education running as it does now in 1991, according to a preliminary budget forecast.

That would bring last year's \$254 million budget (which was a 14.6 per cent increase) to a 1991 figure of \$275.8 million.

At the second meeting in which public school trustees reviewed the 1990 budget Monday night, they heard that the real place to look at making budget

cuts would be in staffing - but that their hands are tied since the board just this year signed a new two-year collective agreement with teaching staff.

"Really folks, we're not talking about cutting the budget, but we're talking about not increasing the budget," said board chair Pat Hillhouse, adding there would have to be some meaningful discussion by trustees on the issue of staffing.

"Before we talk numbers, I'd like to talk ideas," said Burlington trustee Don

Cassidy, noting that without a consensus on the staffing question, specific looks into the budget fragment immediately.

Hillhouse noted that a number of years ago the board decided to hire more staff to decrease pupil-teacher ratios and class sizes. She said the board is now feeling the pinch of that decision.

"Other things... will not really get at the guts of the issue that staffing will," she added.

But cries that the board was committed to its present staffing situation for at

least two years didn't sit well with Halton Hills trustee Dick Howitt, who at the Oct. 22 budget meeting had threatened to leave, charging trustees weren't accomplishing anything, largely due to a lack of information. "Philosophically, I've got a problem with just throwing our hands up in the air and saying we can't do anything. I'm not convinced there isn't some fat on the pork chop and I for one am prepared to nickel and dime the budget to death," he said.

Halton Region's plans for Silver Creek Valley could be put on hold now that local MPP Noel Duignan has asked the Ministry of Environment to conduct a full Environmental Assessment of the area.

Spurred on by residents' concerns over possible cumulative effects of several Region projects proposed for the valley, Duignan is pressing the MOE to carefully scrutinize all the plans. Until that is done, he recommends that all existing development for the Hungry Hollow ravine be put on hold.

Many residents are concerned that the proposed twinning of a trunk sewer running through the valley may disrupt its natural setting, which is classed as environmentally sensitive lands by the Region.

Acton Village Constable Bill Riddle is organizing a food drive in conjunction with the Santa Claus parade in Acton next Saturday, November 17.


