

United Way exceeds residential campaign goal

Halton Hills United Way has great news to report this week — its residential campaign has exceeded its \$30,000 goal.

Arlene Bruce, executive director of Halton Hills United Way expects when all the money is counted up the residential campaign will be five per cent over its goal.

Residential campaign chairperson Julie Williams says there has been a terrific response to the residential campaign and credits the over 800 dedicated volunteers who knocked on doors during October. Bruce is also very pleased that

many people who were left donation envelopes have sent money in.

The bad news, however, is that United Way is still about 10-15 per cent short on its \$150,000 overall goal. But Bruce is optimistic, the campaign is still continuing with many sectors — industrial, retail, professional and commuter still to wrap up.

Bruce has contacted several companies in the commuter campaign and is getting some good and bad reports. At Air Canada, for example, which employs many Halton Hills residents, the campaign

looks active, and the boards of education are reporting "super" results, but Bruce said they were concerned with other companies like Ford which has seen lots of lay-offs this year.

The United Way is "thrilled" with Halton Hills' industrial campaign. Lots of industries have come abroad and the number of payroll deductions has doubled.

The professional campaign could see some improvement, she said, while the retail sector is still in its initial stages.

"We haven't closed the book yet

(on the 1990 campaign) ... there's still a fair amount of wrap up. But we need a big push," said Bruce. "We've got to make our goal ... There are a lot of needs in this community."

Last year the United Way fell short of its \$150,000 goal reaching only \$147,000. Many of the member agencies were not able to get all the money they required.

Counting on the collected monies are partner agency the Red Cross and 18 member agencies:

Seven more agencies are also applying for United Way funding this year. Review committees are being set up now with allocation approvals expected in mid-Spring.

Bruce understands that the economic situation is making people wary of spending money, but feels they should look at a donation in a different perspective: people spend at least 50 cents a day on coffee and if they put a few



weeks of that money towards a donation, it would help others so much. Is giving up a cup of coffee too much to ask? ... think in terms of what it means, she said.

"For those that have a job, it's important to dig a little deeper for those that are losing their jobs," Bruce explained, referring to the recent lay-offs. "It's more important than ever that we think about sharing."
