There are several other small speaking parts, but although they don't have a lot to say, they are on stage for most of the production and have a lot of actions to carry out.

James Collis hosts art exhibit and sale at home

Glen Williams artist James Collis and his wife, Trudy will open their home for an art exhibition and sale today and tomorrow (Nov. 24 and 25), and next weekend, Dec. 1 and 2.

Jim was a commercial artist until he was forced to quit because of health problems. Ten years ago he took up watercolors, and has been painting ever since.

"There's a peace and tranquillity that comes from his paintings," said Trudy. "People who purchase his work always purchase more than one piece."

Jim paints landscapes from photographs, some local and others taken in different parts of Canada while on holidays. Scenes of quaint Atlantic harbors and Rocky mountains adorn the walls in the house, along with paintings of recognizable features in Southern Ontario.

Jim and his wife Trudy moved to Glen Williams seven years ago from Mississauga. Trudy is a teacher-librarian at a Streetsville school.

Jim also teaches a course on drawing cartoons to children at the Halton Hills Recreation Centre. He enjoys making greeting cards for family and friends.

As a child, he reproduced cartoons from the Toronto Star, teaching himself how to paint.

While this is the first show being held at the home, other shows held at his sister's home in Strabane have been Jim's most successful.

"The paintings display nicer in the home. People feel more comfortable just browsing leisurely around," Trudy said.

Rocky V rolls with the punches

It turns out that while Rocky was away fighting in Russia (Rocky IV), his gruff but lovable parasitic brother-in-law Paulie (Burt Young) has mistakenly signed over power of attorney to their accountant, who in turn gambled away Rocky's fortune. Stuck with a monumental debt to the IRS, Rocky, wife Adrian (Talia Shire) and son Rocky Jr. (Sage Stallone) auction off their man-

sion and material possessions, hitch up a U-Haul, and move what little dignity back to the old neighborhood. And to make matters worse, Rocky's been diagnosed as having irreparable brain damage. So what was their first clue?

Trying to dig his way out of despair, Rocky gets inspired by a young, wayward boxer named Tommy Gunn (Tommy Morrison) who begs Rocky to become his manager and trainer. When Rocky reluctantly agrees, a new cycle begins and turns everything completely out of sync.

Now with Rocky V, you're going to get what you've come to expect. There's scenes of reliving past moments and an especially touching flashback between a young Balboa and trainer Mickey (Burgess Meredith). It's a kinder, gentler "Rocky" - the Italian Stallion being put out to pasture as it were. But it's tremendously exhilarating and equally stirring.


The formula works and audiences, regardless of any aversions to sequels, will always cheer-on and be completely enamored by Rocky Balboa. Stallone's genuine passion for the character sparks in every scene.

The film is full of heart and integrity - everything Rocky has come to stand for. A grand finale for a great screen hero ... now if only we could say the same for Rambo.
