Board delays selling properties

The poor real estate market has led the Halton Board of Education to delay plans to put three properties up for sale.

The land was originally set aside for schools, but won't be needed. Burlington Trustee Noel Cooper said trying to sell the property in a depressed real estate market would be a stupid move and asked for a recorded vote.

"Trying to sell this property now invites bids from people who see a bargain. It creates more work for ourselves," Burlington Trustee Peter Abbott said. The board wouldn't be willing to sell the property for a low price, he said.

Abbott suggested tabling a motion to sell two Milton properties, close to Bronte Meadows Park and W.I. Dick Public School and a third property beside Brant Hills School in Burlington.

Burlington Trustee Don Cassidy, chairman of the properties committee which made the recommendation, disagreed.

"We're not in the business of bringing the motion forward again in June, 1991, when it will be considered based on the state of the real estate market. Trustees Dick Howitt and Arlene Bruce were in favor of tabling the motion.

All profits are used for securing, maintaining and improving the Bruce Trail.


