Police seek information on drug dealing

SERGEANT DAVE ATKINSON Crime Stoppers and Halton Regional Police are seeking information in their ongoing fight against drug trafficking.

Many drug users commit other crimes such as robbery and theft to obtain money to buy illegal drugs.

Drug transactions often take place in public places such as plazas, malls, parking lots and street corners and are made without much attempt to hide them from the view of passers-by. Other drug dealers visit local schools to peddle their products to students. More frequently, the drug pushers use their own homes, hoping to avoid the attention of patrolling police officers.

In these situations, neighbors will notice people visiting at all times of the day but only staying a minute or two to make their ille-

gal purchases.

If these individuals can be caught it will help reduce the drug trade and also help eliminate some of the other crimes committed by the same people in our communities.

GST savings on cop cars

Halton Regional Police have found at least one area where they expect to come out ahead as a result of the Goods and Services Tax (GST) - and that's in the purchase of police vehicles.

The police have informed Halton regional council they expect to save about \$20,000 by postponing approximately \$300,000 in vehicle purchases until next year, when the controversial new federal tax is slated to come into effect.

That's because car dealers, while having to charge the 7 per cent GST on January 1, will also have the current 11.1 per cent manufacturers' sales tax eliminated.

That, combined with the fact that regional municipalities get more than half of their GST payouts refunded by the feds, is expected to result in a savings on vehicle purchases to municipalities of "approximately 8 or 9 per cent."

"The police have determined that they can wait the extra few months to replace their vehicles," explained Mr. Rinaldo.
