## Novices unbeaten

The Acton Leathertown West Wearhouse Novice Sabres stretched their unbeaten streak to 20 games with a 4-3 victory over Fergus in Hub League play, and a three game sweep to claim the Erin tournament championship last weekend.

In the Fergus game David Lajeunesse led the way with three goals. Kyle Artem chipped in with one goal and two assists. Jason Christopher had two assists. Richard Raju had one assist.

In the Erin Novice Tournament the Acton team proved they are a contender for the "Silver Stick" preliminary round in Wasaga Beach by scoring a convincing 6-0 win over Richmond Hill in the first game.

Scoring for Acton were David Lajeunesse with two goals and one assist, Shawn Weatherall with two goals, Ryan Young one goal and one assist, Jason Christopher one goal and one assist, Kyle Artem had two assists and Richard Raju had one assist.

The second game against Erin was the game of 'The' game of the tournament. Erin, having lost only once this season and that being to Acton, were out seeking revenge.

Nobody could score until David Lajeunesse potted two goals in the last five minutes of the game to give Acton a 2-0 win which helped to cement a fierce rivalry between these two clubs, which could be repeated in the Acton Novice Tournament on December 27. Assisting on Acton's first goal were Richard Raju and Jason Christopher. Chris Lee assisted on the second.

On Sunday, against Bracebridge, Acton came through with a 5-2 victory.

Acton went ahead 3-0 with goals by Paul Withers from Ryan Young and Shawn Weatherall. Then 15 seconds later David Lajeunesse connected from Kyle Artem and Jason Christopher. Shawn Weatherall unassisted made it 3-0.

Bracebridge scored and then Kyle Artem from David Lajeunesse.

But then Bracebridge started to pick up the slack and were threatening to make a game of it after being awarded a penalty shot that eluded goaltender Andrew Coe.

With two minutes left in the game Ryan Young doused the flames with assists by Shawn Weatherall and Paul Withers.

This was Acton Novices' second tournament championship this season.

## Georgetown claims B crown at London house league event

Georgetown's House League "Chicken Villa" team captured the "B" division championship in the London Bantam House League Tournament last weekend.

Parkhill defeated Georgetown 7-2 in the first game of the tournament.

Georgetown opened the scoring as Michael Bahr dented the twine with an assist going to Brad Socha. Parkhill scored five unanswered goals before Georgetown replied with a goal from Jim Whorley assisted by Brian Loke and Andrew Marshall. Parkhill went on to score two more in the third period to put the game away.

In the second game, Shawn Kelman played one of the best games of his career in goal as he led the Georgetown team to a 3-3 tie against Watford. Because Georgetown scored the first goal of the game, they advanced according to tournament rules.

Michael Bahr opened the scoring unassisted at the 9:12 mark of the first period. The Watford team tied the game at the 9:40 mark of the second period before Georgetown came back with a goal from

Meanwhile, the fans were held in awe as Kelman stopped shot after shot to keep Georgetown in the game. Watford tied the game up with 7:51 to go in the third before Jeff Martin on a breakaway beat the Watford goalie with assists going to Mike Bahr and Jeff Whorley. Watford scored with 51 seconds left to tie the game.

The showdown game against Oakville played Sunday afternoon was almost "heart attack time" for the Georgetown parents in the stands. Georgetown scored the first goal of the game for the third time in a row as Matt Deruchie blasted a shot from the point into the top right corner of the net before the Oakville goalie was able to move.

The Chicken Villa gang kept up the pressure as Deruchie carried the puck down the ice feeding Brett Cormier in front of the net who then tucked the puck into the net to put Georgetown ahead 2-0 with four minutes to go in the first period.

With 36 seconds to go in the second period Deruchie fired

another smolder from the point to put Georgetown ahead 3-0.

The Georgetown team relaxed for about one minute with 3:30 to go in the game and Oakville was quick to take advantage as they pumped two goals past Shawn Kelman who was left pretty much on his own to make the score 3-2 in favor of the "Villa" gang. Oakville pulled their goalie with 1:40 to go in the game, putting pressure on Georgetown before Deruchie put the game away with a long shot from just over the red line with 1:02 to go.

According to coaches Mike Marshall, George Wilson and Keith Whorley, a total effort by every single player on the team was the reason for the Georgetown championship win. Coach Marshall believes that special mention should go to Shawn Kelman, Duayne Erler, Mike Bahr and Scott Wilson who played superlative hockey for the Georgetown team.

The team is hoping to be able to put in a strong performance in the Buffalo March Classic which is being held March 1-3 in Buffalo, New York.
