

# Circumvention of Planning Act stopped

An amendment to the Ontario Planning Act was introduced in the Legislature Dec. 13 by Municipal Affairs minister Dave Cooke.

The amendment will stop people from using their wills to circumvent the normal planning procedure.

"Over the years, many people have used their last will and testament to subdivide properties which would not have been approved for subdivision under the normal planning process," Cooke said.

"In addition, in particularly troubling cases, investors have sold land to elderly or terminally ill people with the agreement that these people subdivide the land by means of their wills, and then bequeath the land back to the investors," he explained.

If this practice is not stopped, he cautioned, the resulting unplanned development will place a severe burden on municipal services and could lead to loss

of valuable agricultural land through its conversion to residential developments.

Cooke said his amendment will be retroactive to July 26, 1990.
