The Credit Valley Conservation Authority is asking all snowmobilers to stop crossing what appear to be open fields at the Orangeville Reservoir.


"During the last three years, with the assistance of the Boy Scouts, we have planted over 55,000 trees on the open fields of the reservoir," says CVCA Superintendent of Field Operations Jim Hastings. "These trees are less than 18 inches tall and cannot be seen easily by the operators of snowmobiles or other off road vehi-

Snowmobilers are killing trees by crushing them or by compacting the snow near the tree which reduces the insulation qualities of the snow exposing the tree to frost damage.


