What budget committee did:

# No to Acton arena, yes to new fire hall

Acton may have to wait another two or three years before it gets a new arena, but a new firehall there is expected to begin construction this summer.

The Town's Budget Committee slashed the approximately \$4 million arena project from this year's capital budget Tuesday night, according to chairperson Councillor Pam Johnston.

"It was cut...partly because of the economy, and the relocation of the arena was another factor — we have no land right now," Johnston said in an interview.

The new Area One firehall was approved, in principle, at an estimated cost of \$1.04 million. Approximately \$95,000 was taken from the Fire Department's training account to help pay for the new facility, which is to be located on the

southeast corner of Churchill Blvd. and Hwy. 7.


The Budget Committee also approved the purchase of a new pumper for the Fire Department.

All decisions by the committee must be approved by council in the spring.

The replacement cost of a new arena was tagged at \$4 million, with approximately \$3.25 million funded by debentures. The annual debt charges would have resulted in a 7.3 per cent increase to next year's taxes, according to Johnston.

The budget committee rejected a staff recommendation to apply for Provincial grants this year in order to receive the money and begin construction of the project in 1992. Instead, the application will not be submitted until next year, which

But not for a new Acton Arena. Funding for a new arena was top on the list of priorities for the newly elected MPP at Queen's Park.

However, Duignan told this newspaper Wednesday, arenas aren't included in a list of possible NDP projects. The New Democrat is still hoping some of the \$700 million the Ontario government is committing to public improvement projects will make its way to Halton Hills.

Duignan added he is also looking at alternative sources of funding.

When the MPP heard Halton Hills' budget committee axed the arena from their list of 1991 priority projects, Duignan said provincial

money will be harder to get for the project.

"Council hasn't made a commitment, until they do, it will remain a low priority for the Province," he said.


"It makes it a little difficult if you don't have the local council behind the project," he said. "But that still won't stop me."

Announcements will be made within the next 10 days on how the \$700 million will be spent. Duignan wouldn't speculate on which Halton Hills projects the money might be used for, or how much money might come to his riding.

Money won't be spent on a partisan basis, so NDP representatives have no guarantee that money will come to their riding, he said.

When he first went into office, Duignan handed a list of local projects he considered priorities over to the government. Projects on the list included:
