

Education minister hints at tying Catholic, public school boards together

costs Catholic education is in no past." danger, Ontario's new education minister has promised.

In a wide-ranging speech during which she promised many new changes and approaches in education, Marion Boyd said she's still a strong believer in Catholic education and separate school boards. But she thinks that in tough economic times especially, many will demand an end to separate school education in favor of a public system containing just a Catholic element.

"There are those in our province," she said, "who believe that if we were to create umbrella school boards, if we were to stop the duplication of school boards ... that this would be a great economy."

Speaking to a large audience of teachers from the Catholic teachers association, Halton elementary unit, the newly installed NDP education minister said many people tend to see things in overly simplistic "and sometimes bigoted" ways.

"The element of choice is extremely important," she said, adding that Catholic teachers and others will be forced to defend the added cost of having separate school boards across Ontario.

Maintaining cultural difference is important, she said, "whether that's Catholic or Francophone or a combination of both, or all the other identities that we enjoy in our diverse society."

She admitted the strategy of better education funding assured by her party during the last election campaign, will be difficult to implement.

"The commitment is still there ... it's going to take time." The NDP had blamed the previous Liberal government for underfunding

> education and for diverting the costs away from the province and down to the local government level, in the form of escalating property

The party promised to fund 60 epr cent of education costs, up significantly from the current level of less than half.

Boyd said she wasn't proud of the fact that operating grants to school boards were boosted only 7.9 per cent for 1991. "It falls far short of what you need, and we know that."

But she said the government is working on keeping property tax increases down.

"No time is worse than a recession to reise property taxes, and we're well aware that education trustees are facing election this year and it's going to be a difficult time for them."

Boyd said that property tax isn't a good measure of a taxpayer's ability to pay, but said no drastic changes in funding education and other essential services until there is wide consensus on where the money should come from.

The minister touched on the increasing role of the classroom teachers in the lives of students, and how teachers are neither trained nor paid to do some of the job now being expected of them, almost as a surrogate parent.

"Your concern as teachers is you don't have the resources or referrals to do it well and properly," she said.

"It puts a lot of pressure on classroom teachers and we need to provide a lot of support mechanisms and servies that make it possible for you to be confident and feel you can take on the role,"

The minister spoke about helping students from non-white racial and cultural backgrounds to have more confidence and a better self image.
