bees are being experimented with

for this purpose.

Tomatoes are produced all year round now whereas previously they had only been produced two or three periods in a year, they told

We were shown how tomato vines are grown in moss and fed

nutrients by piping. This way each vine gets only as much liquid as it can use. These specialists of growing tomatoes can now buy cards of insect eggs that hatch and combat the white fly pest, thus eliminating the need to spray. Each week, the bottom cluster of fruit is picked and the vines keep on growing.

They also brought a large tray of furit and cheese to our table. Marie Murray thanked our hosts for their hospitality and we browsed through the market. We then motored to the home of Gisela Malchin for our business meeting.




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
