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Development charges cut in half

By STUART JOHNSTON Regional councillors have listened to the cry of developers and cut in half proposed charges on construction projects in Halton.

At a final public meeting Tuesday morning, councillors tentatively approved the fee of \$1.10 per square foot, as required by the Provincial Development Charges Act, on all non-residential develop-

ment. The rate would be effective for two years, after which it will be revised.

Over the next few months, a committee is expected to be set up to revise the development charges when the current fee expires. Regional staff, developers, an elected representative and members of the public will be invited to participate on the committee.

The first 5,000 square feet of expansion or redevelopment will be exempt from the charge. Until now, Halton has charged a flat rate of \$9,815 per acre for new business development, but it maintains that doesn't cover the costs of providing services such as roads and utilities.

Regional Council is expected to approve the new rates during its regular meeting on April 17.

Halton Region originally proposed a \$2.80 charge per square foot, but later lowered the proposed rate to \$2.38 after dozens of written and verbal concerns were submitted by developers.

heard from Councillors developers, lawyers and other business people at a public meeting in February, and again Tuesday, that the current economic climate is not suitable to begin raising development costs. They maintained i would deter growth and redevelopment, which would therefore put more of a burden on Halton's economy.

Many threatened to close shop and move to other regions if the full charge was imposed on development.

Treasurer Joe Rinaldo defended the revised charge of \$1.10 by claiming it is an "acceptable balance" between "recovering costs while encouraging growth."

The new fee will recover only 39 per cent of the capital costs of new development, he added, which represents an estimated \$7 million loss in projected revenues over the next two years.

"It has to be recognized that what's before us is essentially paying lip service to the overall recommendation," Chairman Pete Pomeroy told councillors, in defense of the revised fees. "This is a really complex issue...In certain areas in the region a \$1.10 charge may have an impact on the ability to market land in that area, so we must consider that as we go along this road."

Garbage fire
