



Georgetown Rebels wrestled their way to the Halton Junior championship last week, topping White Oaks of Oakville for the crown.

The Rebels, who are just beginning to rebuild a once prominent wrestling program, took the title with 79 points. White Oaks was second with 64, while E.C. Drury of Milton claimed third with 61 points. The junior championships are open to grade 9, 10 and first year wrestlers only.

Georgetown earned four gold medals in the competition, with Bruce Ryan, Steve Brown, Mike Large and Stu Teetzel claiming weight division titles.
