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
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London Town...

London is the starting off point of many European travel destinations, therefore most tourist spend at least one or two days in this historical city. To properly tour London and take in all its sights you could spend more than these few days. City bus tours are easily arranged and a good way to see many of London's attractions. To explore on your own the "underground" subway network can take you just about anywhere. Pick up a map at any station, it shows colour coding for different city destinations and is quite simple to follow. You could also take a two hour cruise down the river Thames which gives a totally different view of this magnificent city.

To say London's attractions are considerable is an understatement. Look for the standard flying over Buckingham Palace that indicates the Royal Family is in residence; watch the Changing of Guard; visit the hushed caverns of Westminister Abbey, resting place of Elizabeth 1, Shakespeare, Dickens, Handel, Tennyson and Chaucer, or explore the dark fascinations of the sinister Tower of London where queens have lost their heads and princes have been murdered in their sleep. Christopher Wren's masterpiece, St. Paul's domed cathedral, and the famous British Museum will captivate lovers of the arts, and others with a taste for the bizarre will by intrigued by Madame Tussaud's lifelike wax replicas of the famous and infamous. Discovering the conviviality of London's pubs is a definite "must", as is afternoon tea at



the gourmet mecca, Fortnum & Mason, where the sales staff dress in frock coats. British pubs are the mainstay of midday meals and such offerings meat and game pies, bangers & mash, shepherd's pie, etc. are both tasty and inexpensive.

London's West End is the focus for theatre and distinguished dining. London's first-run live theatre is among the best anywhere.

Shopping enthusiasts won't want to miss Bond, Regent and Oxford streets. Selfringes features some 200 departments, good quality and modest prices, while opulent Harrods (favored by the Royal Family) is an experience in itself. Try the glittering shops of Mayfair and the upbeat boutiques around Covent Garden, and for contrast, spend some time in the street markets.Follow Oxford Street to Marble Arch and you'll discover Hyde Park where on Sundays anybody with something to says spouts soap-box eloquence at colourful Speakers' Corner. Regents Park with its lake, canal, open-air theatre, and famed London Zoo is also well worth a
