St. John's Anglican Church prepares for 150th

The congregation of St. John's Anglican Church, Nassagaweya, will be celebrating its 150th anniversary next year (1992), and a number of special events are being planned to focus attention

on this historic occasion.

The present church, a sturdilybuilt stone structure, was erected in 1870 to replace the original modest white frame building that had stood on the site since

1844—two years after early Anglican settlers had established a congregation.

The church is located on the northeast corner of the Guelph Line and No. 10 Sideroad in Halton Region's Nassagaweya Township, two km north of Highway 401. It presently serves a largely rural congregation of approximately 50 families.

The current priest-in-charge is Rev. Charles F. Masters of Milton, who is also rector of St. George's Church in neighboring Lowville. He is assisted at St. John's by Captain David Coffin of the Anglican Church Army and Rev. Fred Crook, a retired clergyman.

It was in February, 1842, that four acres of land were given over to the fledgling congregation as the site for a church and cemetery. On Good Friday, March 21, 1913, a great windstorm swept through Halton County damaging St John's Church. Services were held in the nearby Orange Hall in Campbellville until the church was rebuilt.

During its 149-year history, the congregation has been ministered to by a total of 30 priests, the first being Rev. George Graham. Among the clergy serving St. John's was Rev. Beverley Shanley of Hamilton, one of the first female priests to be ordained in Canada and the first to have a parish in Canada at St. John's in 1976.

concern with this kind of thinking is that it endorses and reinforces the concept that those who already have will continue in their already secure future while those who have not, will continue to be "blessed" in poverty.

What we have failed to see, is that although we do struggle with mortgages and interest rates, and GST's, WE, you and I are not the poor - we are the rich! Did you realize that if you own your own home you stand where 98% of the world's population will never stand. Think of it, millions of people who share our earth, will never own their own home. Three quarters of our world will never know what it means to have enough to eat. We are obsessed with diets and overeating while most of the rest of the world grapple with how to feed their chil-

Somehow the church let God's grace be transformed into a graciousness we bestow upon ourselves. We are perhaps sympathetic toward the real poor, but we are not prepared to enter into their suffering because we know, there is nothing blessed about poverty. As we watch the current plight of the Kurdish people we see the reality of the absence of God's will for human dignity, justice and righteousness.

The church of Jesus Christ must take sides. It must side for the Christ like love that cuts across the meaning of having. Our hope - is not in our having but in our giving. This is the spiritual truth that came with Easter morning, with the message of resurrection and is primary in our hope of reconciliation for all people and creation. If we believe it, I mean not in our heads but in our lives - it will shatter our complacency not only in our churches, but in a social structure that has no room, no hope, no love for those who are "the least of these".

God grant His Church the courage to be HIS church.


