posting programs. The Township of West Garafraxa, which recently purchased 624 composters for their community, will kick off Pitch-In Week with a community meeting to provide information about their composting program.

"It's becoming obvious that the objectives of Pitch-In Week have broadened considerably as people become more and more aware of the fact that waste should no longer automatically be deposited into a litter or waste container," said Ankney adding, "We now have so many more choices and we realize that litter and all waste
