GDHS leads senior rugby, Acton drops out

The Georgetown District High School Rebels lead the Halton league in senior rugby with 42 points for and none against. GDHS has four points overall, as do Oakville-Trafalgar and White Oaks.

A shortage of players has prompted one of GDHS' perennial rivals, Acton High School, to pull out of both rugby competitions.

AHS was sharing a second-place tie with three other Halton schools in junior rugby. Drury, Blakelock and Milton High were ahead in the "points for" column.

First-place in the juniors is also a four-way tie, with Oakville-Trafalgar the "points for" leader. GDHS also shares a four-way tie, but for last place. The Rebels have four points for, 28 against.

In midget rugby, White Oaks leads the league with four points, while Oakville-Trafalgar, Georgetown and Notre Dame follow with two each. The Rebels picked up a pair of points when Assumption had to default.

In senior girls' soccer, Georgetown shares first place in the eight-school league with Pearson High after two losses and two wins.
