Georgetown native Brian Hayward, whose contributions in goal came a little too late to save the Minnesota North Stars from also-ran status in the Stanley Cup final is looking for some good street hockey players.

Brian and his brother, Bruce Hayward, are again promoting the Three-on-Three Street Hockey Challenge they devised last year.

"As a kid, I'd race home from school, drag out my net from the garage and get together with my friends for a game of road hockey," Brian recalls.

"We'd choose up sides and play for hours, with games ending either from darkness or because of our parents calling us in for supper."

"You didn't have to be a great skater, you didn't have to be big and fast, as long as you had a stick you could play and have fun."

This summer, ten Ontario and Quebec communities, including Brampton next weekend (June 8 and 9), will host weekend street (ball) hockey competitions in eight different age groups. The Haywards expect close to 16,000 people of all ages to participate in some 4,500 games.

It's a long way from the streets of Georgetown to the Met Centre, where Hayward shared North Stars net duties with Jon Casey last month while Minnesota pursued NHL glory, only to be overpowered in the end by the Pittsburgh Penguins.

Considered an NHL veteran now, with time also served in Winnipeg and Montreal, Hayward was facing another possible move — to the new San Jose team — as this edition went to press Thursday.

Registration is \$60 per team (\$75 for adult competitive). If you can't make the Brampton event next weekend, Mississauga, Burlington and other southern Ontario centres host the challenge at later dates.

In the two months since the team was formed, the defence is improving rapidly, as demonstrated by Trevor Rich's late inning key double play, catching a difficult line drive at second and throwing to Greg McCullough at first to catch the man off base.

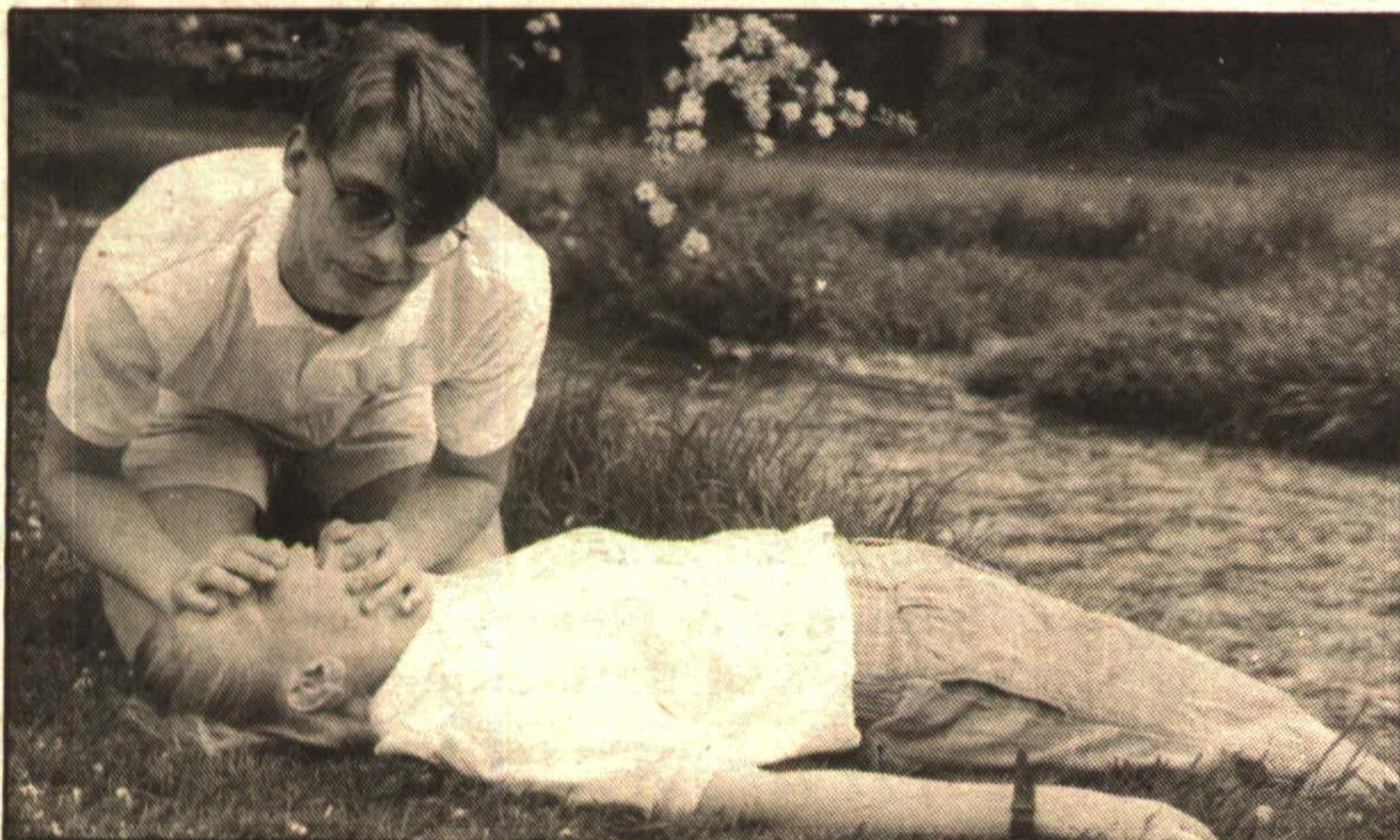
Gord Anderson joins Bemidji State Beavers
