A fresh touch from Jesus daily

There is no food or water in a desert. As the Israelites proceeded across the desert from Egypt to their homeland, they had to depend upon a supply of food and water not normally present. Each morning God instructed them to take up one day's supply of the manna which He put on the ground, because it became unfit to eat after that day. In this way, the people depended upon God each day for their very lives. ¹

In the prayer which Jesus taught His followers, we say, "Give us this day our daily bread." ² We ask not only for enough food to eat, but we ask for spiritual nourishment from Jesus, the "Bread of Life." ³

Manna had to be gathered and eaten each day, so each day we

need a fresh touch from Jesus if we are to grow spiritually. He is the written and living "Word of God" ⁴ with whom we commune as a personal Friend. The manna preserved physical life; the Bread provides eternal life.

Jesus said, "I am the true Bread from heaven, and anyone who eats this Bread shall live forever." ⁵ He is also the "living Water" ⁶ who said that the water He gives is "a well of water springing up into everlasting life." ⁷ The water in the desert came from a rock ⁸ and Christ Jesus is that Rock. ⁹ Only He can give eternal life!

You and I today are as depen-

dent upon the manna from heaven and the water from the rock as were that wandering tribe of nomads many centuries ago. We cannot change the weather or grow food. We cannot create life because life is created by Jesus Christ who speaks the living Word. ¹⁰ He is the living Word who initiates and maintains both physical and spiritual life.

Jesus Christ is the "living Bread" ¹¹ and the "living Water" ¹² who ministers to us. ¹³ His Spirit leads us, guides us, comforts us, and gives us strength for life's arduous journey if we acknowledge Him as Lord.

Bill and Bernice would like to thank all for the lovely cards and gifts, and for making the evening a joyous and memorable occasion.

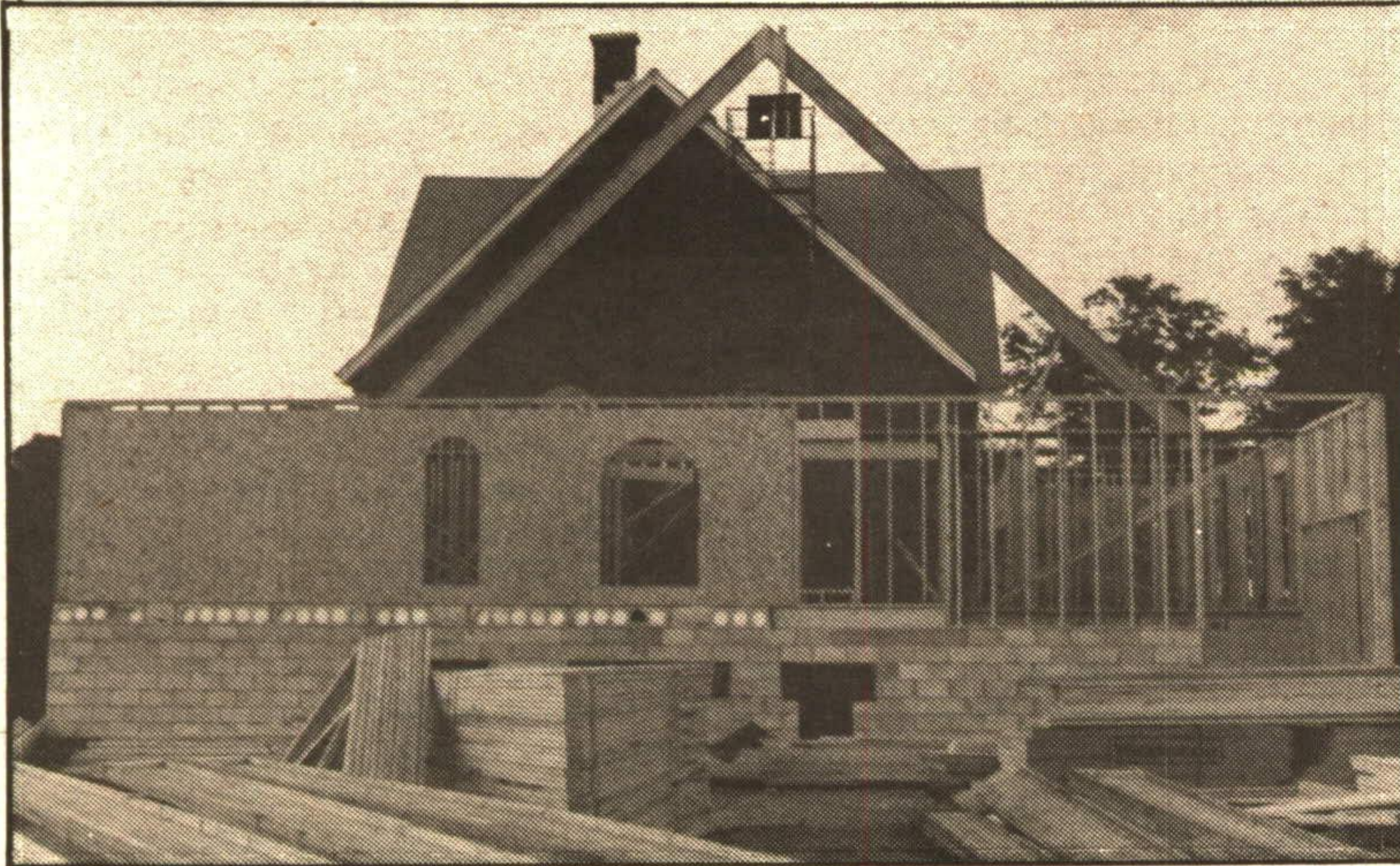
Wedding shower

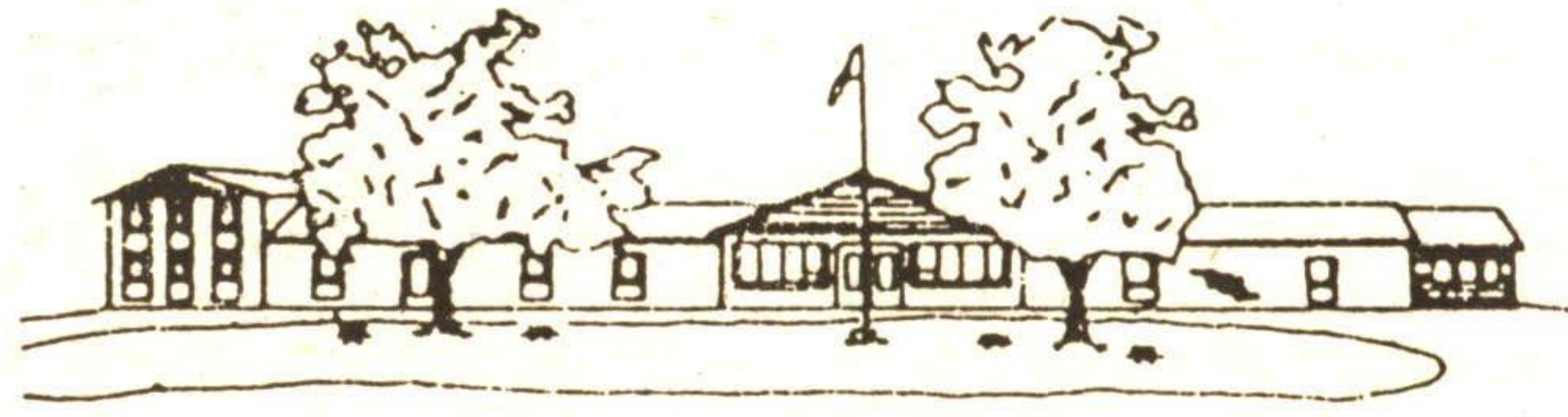
- within the counties of Perth, Huron, Waterloo, Wellington, Dufferin, Oxford and Middlesex
