Swinging Fore...

"DEAD-SOLID, PERFECT!" With SHELLEY WOOLNER **BSGC Head Pro**



1. INTRODUCTION

time throughout our golf life can recall the one shot that felt... Dead-Solid, Perfect! The swing was effortless, the timing was smooth and the contact felt like a hot knife cutting through butter. After taking a deep sigh and hanging on to that delightful moment, you quickly change the tone by asking, "Why can't I do that everytime?"

As an instructor, my responsibility to you is knowledge. Practice

and focussed concentration is your responsibility. Throughout the next few weeks I will share with you the knowledge necessary for you to experience more consistent results which will ultimately allow you to play to your potential. But be careful! How you inter-

pret and practise this information will simply be your perception of ideal. Practice does not make perfect... Practice makes permanent! Therefore you

may need a coach along the way. Rest assured that there aren't any hidden secrets about this game! In order to strike the ball solid and straight, the club must be returned to its original starting position "en route" to its final finishing position. That is the club must be returned to

Each and every one of us, some- "square," with the same loft, the correct lie and to a depth where the bottom of the ball is struck instead of the top!

Eighteen years ago when I was a beginner, I only wish that someone had explained to me that the ball comes off the clubface at 90 degrees every time. I know that my own swing would have developed differently. As shown in the photograph, the lines on the clubface must be returned to the target line

at right angles with 'sweetspot" (or centre of the clubface) looking down the target line. Sounds simple enough, but there are interferences that certainly make this easy task almost impossible.

Therefore, the next few weeks will be devoted explaining

how grip, balance, stance, posture, swing-plane, plus many more components all affect your ability to swing the club with a consistent swing motion and achieving that feeling of "Dead-Solid, Perfect"

more often. Remember, we shouldn't be attempting to make the good shots better... we should be trying to make the unacceptable ones... "Dead-Solid, Perfect!"
